CANADIAN LUMBERMEN MADE AN IMPRESSION.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Presiding at a lecture on "Canada and the War," given by Mr. Hayden, of the Canadian Northern, on Saturday, Sir Edward Clarke said that he recalled a visit to the Dominion in 1903. During his visit Sir Edward said he had witnessed a labor day demonstration of lumbermen and his instinctive remark had been "What would a general not give for a regiment of such men?"

The war, he said, had now brought many of these very men to Britain in the ranks, and with such men there could be no doubt that the Canadian troops would soon be heard of.

HIGHLANDERS HAD A TURN WITH BAYONETS.

PARIS, Feb. 4.—On Friday and Saturday nights the Germans again made furious attacks upon the French positions at Givenchy-Les La Bassée, and Cunchey, says a despatch to the Havas News Agency from Saint Omer, in north-western France.

The Germans tried desperately to pierce the English lines, the message adds, but after violent hand-to-hand struggle the Scotch Highlanders drove them back at the point of the bayonet.

MAY MAKE GOOD LARD OUT OF CORN OIL.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Feb. 4.—After determining that corn oil is an economic substitute for olive oil, Dean L. E. Sayre of the Kansas University School of Pharmacy, is experimenting to determine whether it is a satisfactory substitute for lard. Some of the liquid oil, which is heavy and brown, has been hydrogenated. In this condition it appears white and has about the consistency of cocoa butter, and melts at the temperature of beeswax.

Dean Sayre has been experimenting with corn oil for more than a year. He found that it makes a very good substitute for olive oil in salad dressings and believes that the hydrogenated oil can be used in place of lard. The patented frying mediums are hydrogenated cotton seed oil.

Corn oil is extracted from the soft white centre of the corn, where the life spark dwells. It is a byproduct of the manufacture of starch, glucose and the better grades of corn meal.

OF LOCAL INTEREST.—The Maritime Home for Girls at Truro, which opened last September is already full. Twenty-seven girls have been received, some from each of the three Maritime Provinces. The Board of Directors are now facing the problem of providing increase accommodation. They feel that, during the present financial depression, it is unwise to attempt to erect the comparatively costly permanent buildings. Two houses on the property have been repaired and fitted and are in use.

THE ISLAND'S SHARE.—The Montreal Star under the heading "Little Sister gives generously," says: Prince Edward Island, "the little sister of Confederation," while, proportionately well represented in the different contingents formed or forming for active service, has contributed very generously to the different funds raised in connection with the war. The S. S. Morwenna, of the Black Diamond Line, arrived in Havre, France, on Christmas day with a full cargo of oats, part of a contribution of 100,000 bushels of oats donated by the people of Prince Edward Island. The balance of this contribution is now in Charlottetown awaiting the opening of navigation, when it will be forwarded. Prince Edward Island's contribution was given directly by farmers, each contributing voluntarily and delivering his gift at the nearest railway station. The value of the oats contributed at current market rates was \$60,000 and the amount of cash raised was about \$22,000. In addition to this, the other funds were liberally supported by the little Province, the Patriotic Fund having received \$25,000, the Belgian Relief in cash, clothing and food, about \$130,000 and the Red Cross over \$8,500.

WEDDING BELLS.—A very pleasing event took place at St. Joachim's Church, Verona, River, when Miss Edith May Coady, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Coady, became the bride of J. B. Hughes of Avondale. The bride who was one of Vernon River's most popular young ladies, was attended by her niece Miss Margaret Coady, teacher in St. Joseph's Convent, while the groom was ably supported by his brother Peter. On the immediate friends of the contracting parties were present. The bride was beautifully attired in a suit of blue velvet trimmed with white marabout with hat to match, and carried a beautiful prayer-book the gift of the groom. After the marriage the happy couple left for the home of the bride where a sumptuous wedding dinner awaited them. The afternoon, which was most pleasantly spent in music, song and speeches, passed all too quickly. Towards evening the happy couple drove to their home in Avondale, taking with them the best wishes of a host of friends. The large number of useful and costly presents

restified to the high esteem in which the happy couple are held.


A SOLDIERS' BURIAL.—The funeral of the late Gunner Alfred E. James, whose death occurred in the Station Hospital at Halifax on Sunday, took place from his home at Midgell on Wednesday afternoon. The remains were accompanied to the Island by Gunner Harry McDougall, of Charlottetown. Interment was made in the Methodist Cemetery about nine miles from Morell. The funeral was very largely attended, about fifty sleighs following the remains to their last resting place. Much sympathy is felt for the parents, brothers and sisters of the deceased young man, who gave his life for his country just the same as though he had died in the shock of battle. A brother of the deceased had arrived home from Boston, but too late to be present at the funeral.

CLYDE RIVER.—The following is from the last issue of the Maritime Baptist: This little church has been without pastoral care since last April. Notwithstanding the work moves at once well defined lines, and is making its life felt in the character of its young people. Deacon Wm. Scott is a member of this church. This brother has held a license to preach the Gospel for several years. Last year the Church renewed the license, the Quarterly and the Association endorsed the action of the church. The people are very scattered yet the Sunday School, with Deacon C. D. McLean as superintendent, meets fifty two Sunday's in the year, the attendance in

winter equalling that of summer. Our Endeavor Society, with Deacon Robt. McPhail, as president, takes charge of the mid-week prayer meeting, the youngest member taking his place with the eldest. Large numbers attend from forty to sixty, and the interest is most excellent. The Mission Band is another perennial of vigorous growth. Miss Mayme McPhail is president. It only remains to speak of the W. M. A. S., under the guidance of Mrs. Colin Fraser, and to say that the Society sends to the Convention a sum considerably over \$2 per member. On a recent evening several of these good people visited their "shut in" former pastor, Rev. C. S. McLearn, at North River, and after a very pleasant evening proceeded to complete the object of their visit. Deacon C. D. McLean read an address of gratitude for what the pastor and wife had been permitted to do, and expressing the abiding love which will follow them; Deacon Colin Fraser then presented a purse containing \$27. Coming so unexpectedly, and in view of the fact that the church had paid its usual share of the salary during the long illness of the pastor, it was too much for words. In this connection it should be said that Long Creek, unable to be present, sent as a Christmas donation \$25.

ROSS RIFLE FACTORY GETS RECORD ORDER.

QUEBEC, Feb. 4.—How to house 1,200 experts who will come here from Belgium to work in the Ross rifle factory on an order of 33,000 rifles for the Russian Government, was the problem discussed by the City Council and a committee of prominent citizens, headed by Mr. Georges Morissette, at the City Hall this evening.

An order for 3,000,000 rifles has been placed with the Ross Rifle Company by the Russian Government. This, with the orders they already have on hand, will necessitate the employment of some 3,000 additional hands at the factory, and probably the enlargement of the plank to three times its present size. It has already been decided since the outbreak of war.


The question of housing the twelve hundred Belgian experts who are to aid in the filling of the enormous order in a serious one, and a meeting of builders of Quebec has been called for tomorrow morning, when they will meet the special committee of citizens to discuss the housing of the newcomers.

WILL DO SOMETHING FOR CANADIAN SOLDIERS.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—E. T. Scammell, late of the Military and Naval Immigration League, is busy here on a hospitality scheme in relation to the Second Contingent. The idea of his work is to do something to help along Canadians who have no relatives on this side, and therefore no helpful influences when they are on leave.


