THREE KILLED ON GRAND TRUNK

SARNIA, Ont., Nov. 10.—Three men were killed and at least one person was injured in a freight wreck to-day on the Grand Trunk Railroad, near Waukegan, Ont. The accident occurred in a snowstorm.

The dead: William Moffatt, conductor, George A. Holleran, brakeman, Stapleton.

All the victims lived in this city. A heavy Grand Trunk freight became stalled at Waukegan and a short time later freight train No. 91 westbound crashed into it.

Engineer Burrel of 91, who was at first reported killed was unhurt. The men who were killed were riding in the caboose of the stalled train.
