IRISH CANADIAN WON VICTORIA CROSS.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Corporal Michael O'Leary, who won the Victoria Cross and was promoted to Sergeant in the Field, is an Irish Canadian. He belongs to Regina and was in the Mounted Police. He is the first soldier leaving Canadian shores to win the much coveted honor. He joined the police force at Regina in August 1913, coming from London, England. Previously he had served three years in the Irish Guards. He was a man of splendid physique, a fine type of soldier and highly thought of by the Mounted Police officials.

O'Leary, when a member of a storming party at Cunin, on Feb 1st., pushed to the front of his comrades and killed five Germans who were holding the first barricade. O'Leary then attacked the second barricade, sixty yards beyond and captured it, killing three more Germans and making two other prisoners. O'Leary thus practically secured the enemy's position by himself, preventing the rest of the attacking party from being fired upon.

PROTEST DELAY IN TAKING REPRISALS.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Complaints at the government's delay in enforcing the blockade or whatever reprisals have been decided upon against Germany, are voiced in the editorial columns of the morning papers. The Mail says that the British Nation is laboring under the delusion that Germany is being subjected to a strict blockade, while the very reverse is the fact. Food and raw materials, the paper says, still are being imported into Germany.

The Graphic similarly complains that while the British Cabinet hesitates, a large part of Belgium has been reduced to semi-starvation by German military pressure.

The morning papers also discuss the sinking of the American steamer Evelyn and possible complications which may arise between the United States and Germany because of the incident. The Graphic says that if the German people were guided by pure reason they would try to discover some method of conciliating American opinion.

INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS MAY BE LOOKED FOR IN HOLLAND.

THE HAGUE, Feb. 25.—There is good reason to believe that the political situation in Holland at the present time is such that the most interesting developments might be expected at any moment. There have been numerous meetings between the diplomatic representatives of various countries at the Hague, but the subjects discussed at conferences have been kept strictly secret.

The Netherlands ministers have been in conference with some of the foreign diplomats and at the same time work in the Government offices has been going on night after night until a late hour.

MORE ALIENS INTERNED.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25.—Austrian subjects to the number of two hundred will be taken this morning to the military prison at Spirit Lake, P. Q., where there are already four hundred of them. An escort, under command of Captain G. A. Dillon, of the 55th Irish Canadian Rangers, will be in charge of the party of alien enemies. Ninety per cent. of those who will go to Spirit Lake to-day are men who were arriving in the city, where, owing to the general depression and the fact that they are enemies, they were unable to secure work.

SUMMERSIDE ICE RACES

The Summerside Driving Club held its fourth race meeting on Wednesday afternoon. The ice was good and the crowd was the largest in attendance of any of the races held this winter. There were two classes, namely, a 3-minute trot and a 2.40 pace.

In the three-minute trot there were five starters. Mystery, the fast trotter, driven by Arthur Allen proved too speedy for the bunch, winning first money after dropping the third heat to Premier, who won second place, Brazilian Jr., third, Klzen D. fourth and Sweet Marie fifth. Klzen D., who was looked upon as the winner, was not in his usual good trim and made a number of bad breaks and only landed fourth. Brazilian Jr. is improving every race and no doubt will make the best of them step before the winter is over.

In the two-forty pace there were four starters, namely, Casey Cresceus, Queen Catherine, Yankee Princeton and Douglass. Casey Cresceus, driven by Daniel Steele, won first place being hard pressed by Queen Catherine, a green pacer, which is very speedy and showed up well for her first race in hoppies. Douglass finished third, Yankee Princeton met with an accident in the first heat and was drawn.

GERMAN PRESS REALISES FACTS.

BERLIN, Feb. 25.—The German Government has made known that it objects to the use of expressions like the oft-quoted words "God punish England" or mail going abroad from Germany.

The North German Gazette yesterday called attention to the fact that certain German firms have been rubber-stamping the envelopes and letter-heads used in their correspondence with neutral countries with objectionable inscriptions, which are intended as insults to countries hostile to Germany.

WHAT THE SO-CALLED 'BLOCKADE' MEANS.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—The Morning Post's naval expert, in discussing Germany's proposal to blockade the British coasts with mines and submarines says: "Whether she can accomplish this design is not a question of international law, but a question of fact; it depends for a solution upon two factors—the force she has at command and the force this country has at command. One is not accurately known and the other cannot be disclosed.

Germany probably owns between thirty and forty submarines, a very insufficient number for the purpose, even if they could all be employed at once, but these vessels require constant relief and frequent supplies. The length of their sea endurance depends upon circumstances. A week is the most probable period; a month would be perhaps the longest time at sea. It follows that about half the total number is absent from sea, filling up with supplies and refitting, at any given moment. So the available force would be no more than fifteen or twenty vessels—not a very serious menace. That they can inflict a certain amount of damage is certain, but it is not yet proved that they can inflict more damage than they have hitherto inflicted, for the destruction of commerce by submarines began long before the German announcement on the subject was issued.

"Mining operations are another matter. Mines can be sown quickly and under cover of darkness; but, again, the localities in which mines would be effective are known, and a mine-laying vessel is much more conspicuous than a submarine.

"Apart from the diplomatic design involved in the German scheme, it is possible that the scheme may be used to mask another plan. The altogether apparent candor of the somewhat voluble statement of Admiral Beatty is significant. Whatever may be the terms in which German public statements are framed, it is always safe to conclude that they do not mean what they appear to mean. The inference to be drawn from the resort by Germany to submarine warfare upon commerce is that the German fleet is definitely to remain in harbor, but because the inference is obvious it does not follow that it should be given credence."

THE WIFE OF COUNT ZEPPELIN IS A CANADIAN GIRL.

SARNIA, Ont., Feb. 25.—A fact not generally known is that Countess Zeppelin, wife of the inventor of the famous German aircraft, is a Canadian girl. Countess Zeppelin was the daughter of the late W. H. MacGarvey, and was born in the village of Wyoming, Lambton county, in 1875, going at an early age with her father to live in Austria.
