Death Sentence Of Convicted Murderer Commuted To Life

OTTAWA, Dec. 8—(CP)—John Netcoff, 33, who was under sentence of death will serve a life term at the Dorchester Penitentiary. A B. Commutation of the sentence was announced today by the Secretary of State's Department.

Netcoff was found guilty of the murder on July 17 of Bessie Curtis, 21, his former housekeeper and sentenced to hang Dec. 14. The jury at the trial which took place Sept. 27, recommended mercy.

Miss Curtis was killed when Netcoff attacked her with a hammer while she was walking with her sister on a wharf at Saint John, according to evidence at the trial.

Defence counsel contended prosecution had driven Netcoff to a point where he was not responsible for his action. The prosecution maintained the motive for the slaying was "blind, jealous rage."

Soldiers Subdue Blaze At Halifax

HALIFAX, Dec. 8—(CP)—Soldiers of three units of the Halifax Garrison today subdued a fire of unknown origin that threatened the Halifax Harbor fort of York re-doubt. The Master Gunner's cottage within the ramparts, was destroyed.

Forty soldiers answered an emergency call to the fort on the western side of the harbor and near the entrance. Artillery Sergeant Comerford, caretaker of the fort, his wife and two children, occupied the cottage and escaped unharm.

Loss by destruction of the Government-owned building was not estimated by military officials.

Charlottetown Man Called To Ontario Bench

(Canadian Press Despatch) TORONTO, Dec. 8—J. Gerald Kelly, K. C., whose appointment to the Supreme Court of Ontario was announced last night at Ottawa, was born at Charlottetown 41 years ago.

He attended West Kent public school and Prince of Wales College and the University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall at Toronto.

Mr. Kelly practised law here with Arthur Roebuck, K. C., then with R. T. Harding, K. C. and became a partner of Louis Singer and later of T. H. Wickett.

He has been in private practice here since last spring.

Mr. Kelly who served overseas with the New Brunswick Infantry, was a member of the Separate School Board for nine years and chairman in 1936. He is married and has six children.

(Judge Kelly is a son of the late James Kelly and Mrs. Kelly of Charlottetown. His mother and sister, Mrs. Perley Williams, are residing in this city. He has two brothers in Ontario. One brother, Lieut. Carl Kelly, who served overseas during the Great War, died about a year ago.)

Pleads Self-Defence On Murder Charge

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8—Self-defence figured prominently today in the trial of a juror to try "Colonel" Martin Snyder, 44-year-old Broadway and Chicago raito figure, charged with kidnapping and assault to commit murder.

enjoys the confidence, admiration and good-will of all our citizens. Since coming to Charlottetown thirteen years ago he has been interested in every worthwhile movement for the advancement and welfare of this community and Province.

"Tonight I am thinking in a very special way of his outstanding leadership and devoted service on behalf of the Boy Scout movement, to which movement he has a power of great strength. He has been actively associated with it for many years, and as president of the Provincial Association has not only put Scouting on the map as far as Prince Edward Island is concerned, but I believe his work has been of such a high character that it is bound to have a permanent and far-reaching effect on the history of Scouting in this Province and throughout the Dominion.

"When Mr. Murray assumed the office of president of the Provincial Association we had in the vicinity of 240 Scouts and 23 leaders. Today we have nearly 900 Scouts and 90 leaders; and by his influence and example there has come about a vast change of thought on the part of our citizens as to the value and importance of Boy Scout work. Being a born leader of boys as well as of men, he succeeded in establishing a contact between the movement and the man on the street, who was formerly indifferent to Scouting objectives.

"Toy Matinee" At Prince Edward On Saturday Morning

The Boy Scouts of Charlottetown are conducting a "Toy Matinee" at Prince Edward Theatre on Saturday morning. Mr. Arthur Cooper, Manager, and the staff, have been kind enough to donate the Theatre and films for this occasion.

This is a new venture in Charlottetown. The main idea is to secure repairable toys to supply the Boy Scout Toy Shop. The Scouts will repair these toys, so that needy children may have them at Christmas. Admission to the Toy Matinee is one or more repairable toys, books, dolls, etc.

The Scout Toy Shop forms one of the great chains of Toy Shops, which the Boy Scouts conduct across Canada. Last year there were over 250 such shops from Halifax to Vancouver, which mended some seventy thousand toys and presented them to needy children. In this way many a child received a toy, who otherwise would have been forgotten and passed by, by Santa Clause.

The Scouts would ask parents to see that their boys and girls take toys which are in repairable condition.

There is no admission by money—just TOYS.
