Over 8 Millions Saved

This total amount on which the saving would apply was roughly \$83,000,000, Premier Bennett said, and the estimated saving would be approximately \$8,300,000. This would pay the interest on a loan of \$160,000,000 and was therefore, "no mean sum."

The general attitude of the civil servants affected by the resolution had shown some wide contrasts. The delegation which waited on the government earlier in the day had presented views which the Prime Minister said were doubtless familiar to the members of the House.

Compared with these representations against the reduction, Premier Bennett continued, he and other members of the government had been receiving in every mail letters from individual members of the service in every grade, expressing not only a willingness but a desire to contribute to the efforts of the Government toward sustaining the economic welfare of the Dominion.

He was "not unmindful," said Mr. Bennett, of efforts being made to develop the resolution into a political question. "But the Government will not be deterred from what it conceives to be its duty."

Effective For One Year

The bill was effective for one year only, he said. The restrictions exempting the lower salaried workers would mean, he was confident, that no member of the service would suffer any actual hardship. He took strong exception to the suggestion that political capital was being made by the Opposition on the salary reduction proposal. What the Opposition had been concerned about was the justice of the method which was suggested for making the cut. It felt that something in the nature of a graded contribution, having regard to the ability to pay and the salary received, would be more just.

If the salaries of civil servants were to be cut down, Mr. King suggested, Parliament might very well forego carrying on some of the investigations which were "expensive and unnecessary." Why in order to satisfy the "wounded pride" of the Prime Minister, should the investigation into the Gordon charges be held, he asked. It was a "pure waste." Witnesses would have to be brought to Ottawa, and other expenses incurred. Mr. King suggested that the prime minister cancel this investigation.

Opposition to salary reduction was voiced by A. A. Heaps, (Lab. Winnipeg North.) Its consequence would be the decline in purchasing power of those affected.

M. N. Campbell, (Prog. MacKenzie) said the policy of the Government in reducing the salaries of the civil servants was a good one but he believed the reductions should be made more proportionately so as to affect seriously only those who were in a position to contribute.

Representatives of the Crown in various provinces, Judges, the Military and Air Force and member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police were being exempted. Where a civil servant is receiving a living allowance, the deduction of ten per cent would be from his salary only and not from his salary plus his living allowance. If, on the other hand, a public servant received two remunerations which were computed together as a basis for his participation in the Superannuation Act, the decrease of ten per cent would be from this total.

Suggestions had been made that there should be a decrease of ten per cent in the salaries paid to Judges; but authorities had taken the view that this would be a "breach of statutory rights." There were other ways of dealing with this question, though, upon which no decision had been made.

The cut would apply to all agents or trustees of the government such as the grain commissioners, railway commissioners and harbor commissioners, the Prime Minister stated.

The Canadian National employees would be dealt with by the railway themselves, said Mr. Bennett.

Quoting from the remarks of an English observer, Mr. Woodsworth said it was "a bankers' policy to meet a bankers' crisis brought on by bankers' mismanagement."

MEETS CIVIL SERVANTS

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 26.—Nothing but the belief of national necessity had governed the action of the administration in making the decreases which will come into effect on April 1, Premier Bennett told a deputation from civil service organizations which waited upon the Government today. Through war obligations and pensions alone, Canada had to pay out \$180,000,000 annually; and after the country had balanced her budget there was five million dollars per month to be paid out in connection with the railways. The whole task called for considerable energy; and he did not think that the 60,000 government employees would think they were being asked to give too much in making the sacrifice proposed during the coming year. "I need only say," the Prime Minister said in speaking of expenditures, "that there is a limit to the people paying taxes and we must economize and propose doing so."

V. C. Phelan, Ottawa, who headed the deputation asked that reductions or deductions made should be purely temporary in character. He suggested some understanding that the rates previously paid would be continued when the causes on which action was being taken were removed. Mr. Phelan thought contributions to superannuation fund should be continued upon the basis of normal salary rates. Stopping of the annual increases presented a further burden on many persons in the public service he claimed.

A memorandum setting forth the attitude of the civil service federation to the reductions was presented to the Government.
