The following from the Prince Albert Alta. Advocate refers to a former West River woman:—An old pioneer, respected and beloved by every one in the community in which she enjoyed a very wide acquaintance, passed to her last sleep on Thursday last, 11th inst., at her home at Island Lake in the person of Mrs. Jane McKenzie, wife of J. C. McKenzie, at the ripe age of 73 years. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, interesting being made in the Presbyterian cemetery, Prince Albert, the impressive service being conducted by Revs. Jas. Bryant and C. G. Young. The hearse was followed to the grave by a long line of carriages, amongst which the Prince Albert Fire Company turned out in force, as well as members of the local lodges of Oddfellows and Foresters. The casket was covered with floral wreaths and emblems, amongst which was a fine floral tribute from the members of the Fire Company, in the form of "Gates Ajar." Deceased, ever a loving wife and tender mother, came with her husband and family to Prince Albert in 1883 and remained in town for a few years, prior to moving out to the homestead at Island Lake, remaining there ever since, where a large measure of prosperity rewarded continued industry and activity. Besides a sorrowing husband, deceased leaves a grown up family to grieve over the taking away of a loved one, comprising three sons and two daughters, Norman, now residing at Lethbridge, Alta., John A., of the firm of W. Y. Davis & Co., Prince Albert; Mrs. A. C. Davidson, Duck Lake, and James and Mabel, living on the homestead. (Mrs. McKenzie was a sister of the late Alex. McKenzie, whose death at West River took place on the 21st. The surviving sisters are Mrs. John Currie, Mrs. Christie McNeill and Mrs. Jessie Barnaby, city; and Mrs. Flora McLean, Long Creek.)
