WAR CORRESPONDENTS

Not Permitted to See Much Fighting in Recent Wars

William Maxwell, of the London Standard, who has seen thirty-four campaigns and is one of the famous of living war correspondents, says that the present war will either extinguish the war correspondent or give him a new birth. Kitchener's preference would be the extinction of the correspondent, for, although Kitchener on one occasion acted as war correspondent himself, he has little love for the fraternity. Being in danger for praise, he does not see how he could use a correspondent, and he can easily see how the correspondent might interfere with his plans.

The profession of war correspondent was distinctly lowered by the raft of alleged journalists who flocked to the Balkans upon the occasion of the war with Turkey. There were about 100 persons accredited to the Bulgarian army as correspondents, most of whom had never been in a newspaper office in their lives. Few, indeed, were competent observers and what a problem this unorganized mob would constitute, and so they selected a few reputable reporters and secretly gave them passes for the front, detaining the others in the rear on one pretext or another. The correspondents' revenge was taken by writing books about the war, the material being almost wholly gathered from hearsay. When the second war broke out, some of these authors had the hardihood to again present themselves at army headquarters, but this time they were escorted to the border and forbidden to return.

In the present war the French Government is publishing a newspaper in the field, and the Belgian army did likewise until the pressure of defending the country became too great a task. All countries have established a most rigid censorship, that of Great Britain being the most difficult to evade.

Russian Rough Riders Included in the Russian army are about 1,500,000 Cossacks, strenuous fighting men and magnificent horsemen. The Cossacks, as a rule, are more highly educated than the average Russian peasant, and twenty years' military service is obligatory for the men, who supply their own uniforms, horses, and equipment, the Government providing the arms. In return for this the State gives large grants of land to the Cossacks. The Cossack's liability to military service does not end at forty or so. He is always at the Czar's command.

FIXING THE BLAME

When historians look back upon this time when the world was mad and mighty nations made up of people supposed to be rational permitted their remorseless war lords to herd them like sheep and drive them to the shambles, their first concern will be to fix the responsibility for the outbreak. They will not fail to remark that a single word from the Austrian ultimatum to Serbia, or would have induced the dual monarchy to accept the Serbian concessions as sufficient. That word was not forthcoming, as they will note. Germany was as ready for the conflict as she could ever expect to be. She had just completed her Kiel canal. She had just increased her army to a prodigious total by a special war tax in time of peace, a tax which she could never expect to repeat until war had begun. She had made all possible financial preparation for the conflict and her storehouses were bursting with a two years' supply of war munitions and necessities. In fine, the Kaiser, after twenty years of herculean effort, was ready for the test. He had strained the national resources to the uttermost, was as ready as he could ever hope to be, and gave the word to fire at a time when Great Britain seemed to have a rebellion on her hands which would keep her out of the conflict.—Rochester Post Express.

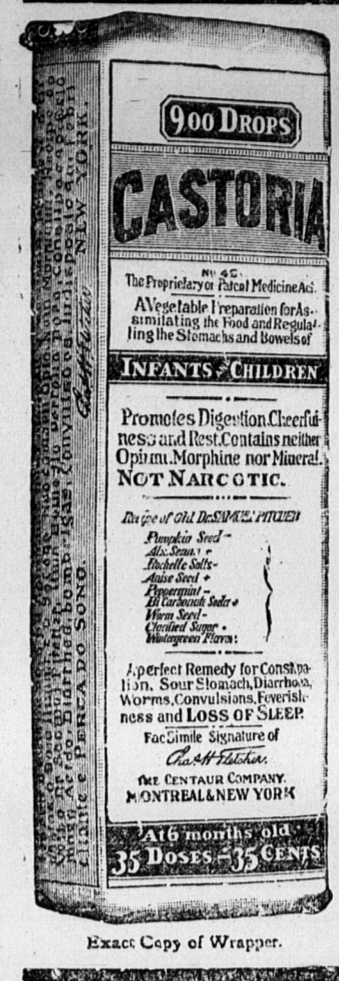
FISTS IN WARFARE

In all ages the use of primitive means of defence and offence has been a mark of warfare. When Wat Tyler's men of Kent marched over London Bridge and scared the City and Court almost to death, their arms were sickles and billhooks and scythes, and a few blacksmith's tools. The same applies to the arming of the men of Devon and Somerset at the Battle of Sedgemoor, the last real battle fought on English ground. But even in these days of arms of precision there have been many cases where these scientific tools have been discarded in favor of something much more primitive.

For instance, at the Battle of Inker-mann, which was a soldier's battle, fought in a mist almost without leadership, many of the English soldiers, finding their fire useless and their bayonets untrustworthy and bent, went in with their fists in true British style. Bluejackets have more than once followed this example when a punitive force has been landed to punish natives. The Tars have gone for them with fists and baying pins, possibly feeling that anything more deadly would be more than the occasion required.

The band has on many occasions joined in the fray. It is reported to have occurred in the late war in the Balkans, during the later fighting which took place between the late allies, Bulgarians and Servians. The former were greatly outnumbered, and seeing them getting the worst of it, the band went into the mêlée with their instruments, and many a Serbian was laid low by a blow from the butt-end of cornet, opeocleide, and trombone, not to mention the formidable bassoon.

In one of the fierce actions in the Peninsular War ammunition ran short, and many shifts were resorted to in order to make up for the lack of bullets. The chief means were buttons. There were not many left on the soldiers' uniforms when the fight was over. Today, of course, a soldier could not do this, for all the rifles are breech-loaders, but in those days it was different.
