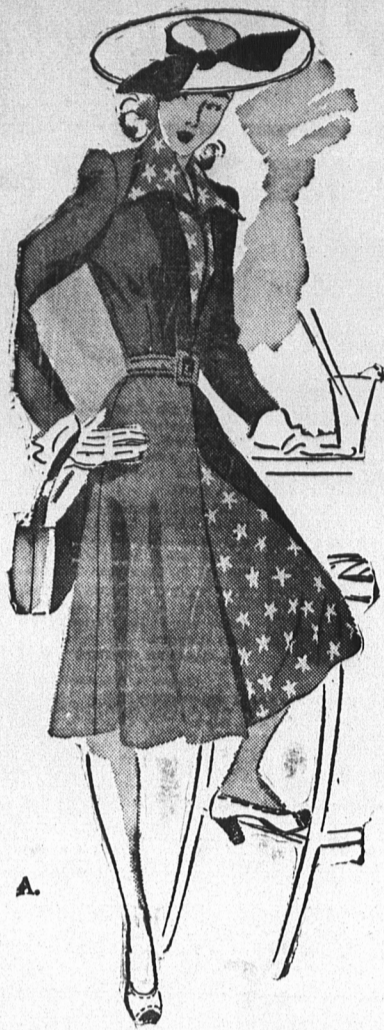

GLASGOW, May 6 (CP)-Yves Fran welterweight boxer of the Free French forces, Sgt. Robert Funnell, not only escaped to Britain from France, he brought an anti-tank gun and two machine guns with him on the boat.
