His motor stopped as he was descending, and he made a glide of two miles, landing easily in a wheat field.

METHODIST'S CONFERENCE

(Continued from page 1.)

Rev. J.A. Ives presented the report of the parsonage aid committee.

Rev. H.E. Thomas reported "that the committee reported to consider a communication from the Loyal Orange Association of Prince Edward Island asking the conference to pass a resolution requesting that no change be made in the King's coronation oath met, and after consideration of the matter, recommended that no action be taken by this conference."

Rev. George F. Dawson, secretary-treasurer of the supernumerary fund, and Dr. Evans, of Hampton, gave reports on the fund. In a discussion which followed many ministers and laymen participated. The debate hinged on a resolution asking the general conference to make a change in the discipline increasing assessments on districts.

It was said that only eighty per cent. of the supernumerary claims were paid and consequently something had to be done.

After discussion by Dr. Secord, J. N. Harvey, Col. Moore, J.W. Smith, of St. John, C. A. Sampson, of Fredericton and others, a resolution was passed unanimously both by the conference and by the members of the supernumerary committee present, that the discipline be amended so that the Nova Scotia conference should be required to raise for supernumerary purposes \$3,700 instead of \$2,300; the New Brunswick and P.E.I. Island conference, \$3200 instead of \$2000, and the Newfoundland conference \$1600 instead of \$1000.

An alternative resolution was also passed naming a smaller increase providing the change did not meet with the approval of other conferences and of the general conference.

Dr. Borden has engaged as assistant director of Mount Allison Musical Conservatory, Prof. Robert Pickard, of Leeds, England, as organist and pianist who comes with exceptional high recommendations.

The fourth session of the conference convened at 2 o'clock, Dr. Sprague in the chair. Rev. J.W. McNeill submitted the report of the board of trustees. The total receipts were \$560.99; total expenditures \$559.66, leaving a balance of \$1.33.

Rev. C.W. Hamilton, of Salisbury, submitted the report of temperance, prohibition and moral reform committee. The receipts from the various districts were as follows: St. John, \$311.09; Fredericton, \$36.25; Woodstock, \$37.37; Chatham, \$28.05; Sackville, \$82.95; St. Stephen, \$27.25; Charlottetown, \$48; Summerside, \$33.50; total, \$453.47.

Rev. T. Albert Moore, general secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, delivered a forcible address in which he spoke of the objects and aims of the Alliance and the work which it was accomplishing.

The following resolution, moved by Dr. Campbell, and seconded by Henry Smith, was unanimously passed: That this conference has listened with great pleasure to T. Albert Moore, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance in Canada, thanks him for his stirring and luminous address, records its deep sympathy with the work of the Alliance, and assures Dr. Moore and his associates of the loyal and hearty support of the con-

ference in preserving for Canada the Lord's Day.

Rev. J.W. Aikens, assistant secretary of temperance and moral reform, in a good address, spoke of the work with which he is associated. The following resolution, moved by Rev. H. E. Thomas and seconded by Rev. L.J. Wason, was passed:

Resolved, that this conference hav-

ing heard with pleasure Rev. Mr. o'clock, Dr. Inch in the chair. Rev. Aikens, assistant secretary of temperance and moral reform, would extend to him a hearty welcome upon his first official visit to our annual session, and would assure him of its sincere interest in the work of the department and expresses the hope that the success which has so marked his efforts in all Christian enterprises in the past, may continue to attend in his new field of honor and opportunity to which he has been called.

The greetings of the Nova Scotia conference were received. An educational anniversary was held at 3

W. G. Watson submitted the report of the educational fund. The receipts from districts were as follows: St. John, \$440.61; Fredericton \$216.50; Woodstock, \$116.44; Chatham, \$103; Sackville, \$425.98; St. Stephen, \$68.35; Charlottetown, \$269.38; Summerside, \$126; total for the year, \$1,767. The total for the previous year was \$1,712.33, an increase of \$54.73.

The children's fund committee reported through Rev. James Crisp. Rev. Dr. Graham, general educational secretary, gave a particularly strong and stirring address. There

had been unprecedented progress, he said, in educational work during the last quadrennium. The income had grown from \$30,000 the first year of the quadrennium to over \$50,000, during the past year; \$117,000 had been raised in preceding quadrennium and \$186,000 in this quadrennium, an increase of 60 per cent. In the preceding quadrennium there were 480 probationers, in last 1,054; \$9,000 had been paid in fees for probationers in preceding, and in last quadrennium, \$26,400. These figures, the speaker said, gave some idea of what was being done along educational lines.

Dr. Graham referred to the idea of summer supply, whereby students, studying for the ministry, were given work during the summer months. This scheme had worked admirably and was infinitely superior to the old method of making loans to probationers. The first year the scheme was tried 107 students were employed earning \$7,925; the second year 149, earning \$11,902; third year 170, earning \$13,819. Debt is a curse, the speaker said, and by far the best method is to give the boys a chance to work for Jesus' Christ and pay their way at college at the same time.
