ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

PLOUGHING has been begun in several sections of the country but the ground is reported as not in the best condition.

THE several Allan line steamers due at Halifax within the next few weeks, have 241 first, 1,022 second and 3,622 third-class passengers, a total of 3,965—a first-class lot of people bound for the Canadian Northwest.

THE St. John's, Nfld., Telegram says: Mrs. Carrie Nation, the famous saloon smasher, is now in Prince Edward Island and will leave for St. John's on Saturday next. Last reports say that Carrie was in a museum out west.

THE stall in the north east corner of the market shack occupied by J. J. Gay & Son has been much improved by the addition of a door for entrance at the corner and the placing of two large windows for display of vegetables. The improvements add much to the convenience of customers in reaching the stall.

THE City of London brought to the city Saturday from Victoria one of the largest passenger lists for a long time. Among those returning in the afternoon were Angus Brien, Henry and Mrs. Wadman, J. S. McQuarrie, Mr. Lowther, Rev. C. R. Cumming with, Mrs. French, Quebec Matthew Smith, Misses Smith, Miss Etta Calbeck, Aaron Collett, Henry McLean and others. She returned Saturday night with a large general cargo.

A DISPATCH from Moncton says:—Among the general I. C. R. changes which have been officially announced Herbert G. Stevens has been appointed private secretary to Mr. Joughins, mechanical superintendent, and Walter Appleton is acting chief clerk. Mr. Joughins is given charge of the mechanical department of the Prince Edward Island railway as well as the Intercolonial. It is understood his salary will be four thousand a year.

A. P. Lewis, manager of the Portland Packing Co., Cape Tormentine is in town. The lobster season does not open along that shore until the 25th inst. while fishing has already begun at Cape Spear. His company are making preparations for about the usual catch. They will have a new factory at Cadman's Corner, which will be completed in a few days. It will be one of the best factories along the shore and has cost nearly \$1000.—Sackville Post.

THERE was a sad scene at the S. & L. depot this morning. The ambulance brought from the hospital a young man of about 30 years of age, James McFadyen who was being taken to his home in Prince Edward Island by his father. Some months ago young McFadyen, who was working at No. 2, contracted typhoid and was taken to the hospital. Recovered from typhoid, he developed tuberculosis and his decline has been pitifully rapid. A sister resides in Glace Bay.—Glace Bay Gazette.

THERE was quite a falling off in the shipment of potatoes to Boston by this week's steamer, owing to the easier tendency on that market. The United States of late has been receiving large importations from Europe, and it has only been a question of time when a break would occur. It has held off longer than a good many anticipated, and as a consequence the market for Island potatoes has advanced in the last two weeks, until the date of writing 70 cents is asked. When prices get too high they are apt to become unsteady, and it is therefore uncertain how long this price will hold. There is certainly a scarcity of stuff in the country and on the entire Atlantic seaboard, but the situation hinges on the extent of European importations and their effect on the United States market. At the moment the tendency is easier, and it is only a few weeks to the first of June, when the new potatoes will be on the American market. Turnips are in good demand and sell freely at \$1.10 per bag. Oats are easier. A Western broker yesterday was offering Ontario oats delivered in Halifax at 43 cents, and there is no doubt they could have been bought at 43 cents. It is this with which the P. E. Island shippers have to reckon, and therefore it is useless to anticipate the prices which ruled earlier in the season.—Maritime Merchant.

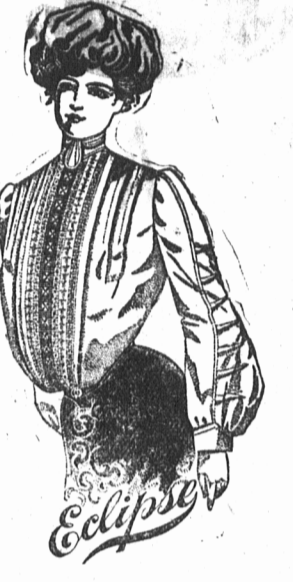

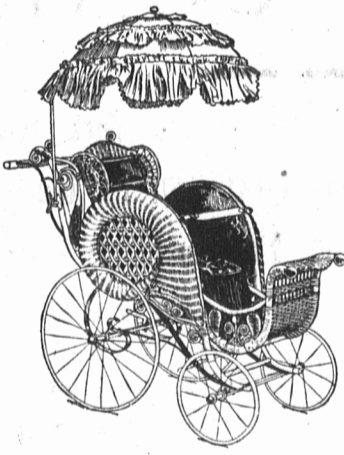
