well again after indisposed for some
time.

THE remains of the late Catherine
Connolly were interred yesterday morning.
The services at St. Dunstan's Cathedral
and at the grave were conducted by Rev.
Dr. Morrison. The pall-bearers were
Thomas Campbell, James Eden, William
Murray, James Murphy, Michael Duffy
and John Johnston. The deceased was
the mother of Mr. John Connolly, of the
late firm of Connolly Bros.

THE regular monthly meeting of the
School Board was held last evening.
The full Board was present. The teacher's
reports for last month showed the enroll-
ment to be 1334. Daily average attendance
1161. The per centage of attendance 90.
No. of cases of tardiness 211. Pro rata of
tardiness, 12. Number truants two.
Number visits to parents 203. No cases
corporal punishment six. Fell below
average in grading 59. Requests to
leave school 135. The highest
per centage of attendance in Prince
Street school was made in Principal
Saman's room—96 per cent. In Queen
Square school, R. E. Smith's room 99 per
cent. West Kent, N. A. Campbell's
room 93 per cent. Mr. Yeo and Miss
McMillan reported no cases of tardiness
for the month. The Board expressed
their disapproval of the action of certain
teachers absenting themselves during the
past month without permission from the
Board. The contract for the erection of a
janitor's cottage was awarded to Michael
Kelly, his tender being the lowest. Ten-
der for sewerage was awarded to
Mr. T. A. McLean for Prince Street
and West Kent schools, his tender
being the lowest. The contracts call
for the completion of the works as
follows: Janitor's cottage, July 15; sewerage
August 15th. Miss Brown who tendered
her resignation as teacher in the 3rd. de-
partment, West Kent school was ac-
cepted and Miss Edith Stramberg was
appointed to fill the position. It was
agreed that the committee on property
wait upon the City Council in the matter
of using debentures for sewerage and
janitor's cottage. A committee composed
of Drs. Jenkins and Taylor was ap-
pointed to look into the placing of fire escapes
on the school buildings. The members
of the board took into consideration the
vacation of class rooms during recess
and the proper ventilation of the
rooms and also recommended that Eng-
lish composition receive special at-
tention, that at least pupils be
required to write a composition
once a week, especially in the
upper grades. It was also recommended
that physical drill receive greater atten-
tion than at present, and that the com-
mittee on discipline be directed to look in-
to the matter. The Board of Trustees
will meet at Prince Street school on
Thursday morning at 9 o'clock to select a
site for the new janitor's cottage, etc. A
fire extinguisher was submitted for ex-
amination to the Board but no action was
taken.

train to the city.

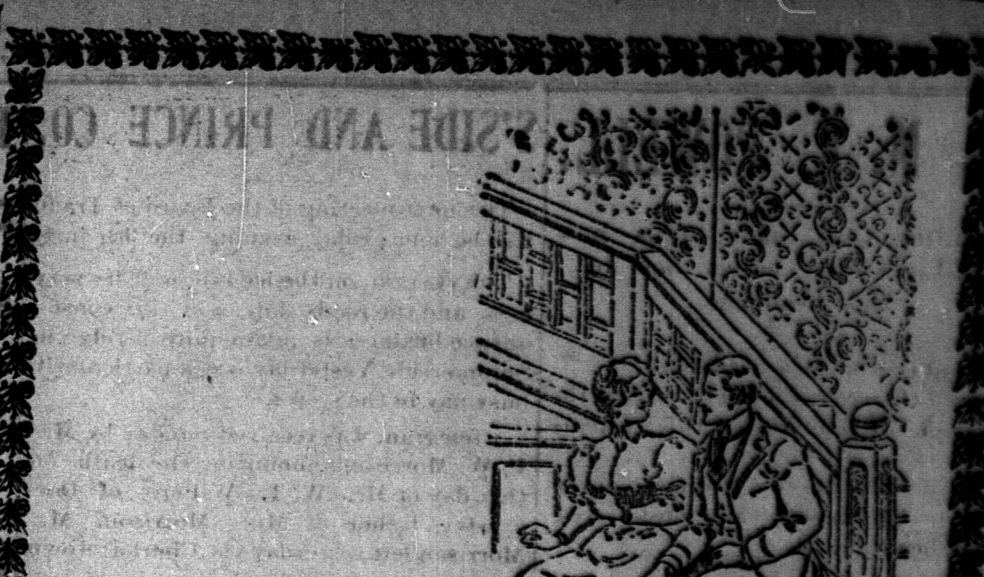
Mr. L. U. Fowler, High Secretary of the
