The Guardian's correspondent writing from Sydney on the 9th inst., says: The enrollment of the Summer School of Science, gives promise of being much beyond the average this year. Many were added today and this evening's train is expected to bring several more. Last Sunday was observed by the school in the usual devotional manner. Rev. Dr. Andrews of Mt. Allison University preached in St. Matthews (Presbyterian) Church to a large audience in which was found the most of the local clergy. His text was "The good seed in the children of the Kingdom." In opening the discourse the preacher affirmed that God's object in nature and in grace was the development of the highest life. The best test by which to try any system of Education, civic life, jurisprudence etc was what kind of men and women, boys and girls, were produced under it.—The aim of all was to create individual character. The commonly accepted theory of the formation of the solar system was that all was originally a vast nebulous mass—characterless state out of which in time there was evolved distinct planets, sun, moon, etc, each with its individual character—in the lower forms or lifeless forms of creation, no change is shown, crystals of salt, sugar rock, etc are formed after the same pattern. If you were to dissolve these substances and recrystallize them a thousand times the same plan of formation would be followed each time, but when you come into the realm of life there is constant change, constant development there. The lowest orders reproduce themselves with greatest ease and rapidity, as we proceed upward in the scale, the effort for reproduction increases and the number decreases. While the salmon produces by the million the bald eagle lays but two eggs in her nest. In all the lower animals when the period of reproduction ceases the creature ceases to live. In the human animal, the highest in the series,—this is not true. Why? because there is an intelligence in the child that requires education, training, and the parent lives that this may be effected. In the lower animals instinct is a sufficient guide for life. This clearly reasoned, and scholarly discourse was an admirable contribution to the work of the Summer School, and gave to those attending subjects for reflection, which will be helpful to them in their future work. The exalted position that man has in the economy of nature was impressed upon the hearers and the responsibility it involved was urged upon them.
