the Solloway-Mills office staff. One camera was smashed and when the row was over the offenders told the camera man to send the bill to Solloway-Mills office.

Reading of the charges laid by J. J. Frawley of the Alberta Department of Attorney General, occupied about ten minutes. The charges were as follows:

1.—Common law conspiracy to defraud.

2.—Conspiracy to affect the public market prices of stocks.

3.—Conspiracy to defraud the public under section 444 of the criminal code.

4.—Conspiracy to commit bucketing under section 281 of the criminal code.

5.—Gaming in stock under section 231 of the criminal code.

C. Hendrickson and L. L. Manson directors of the Solloway-Mills organization and "divers other persons" were mentioned in the charges. A. L. Smith, K. C., spokesman for the prosecution asked for a remand for eight days, stating that he did not believe the prosecution would be able to complete its investigations in that time. S. Bellman, K. C., for the defence, was asked whether or not the remand was agreeable to him, and declared that it was.

REPORT OF GRAND JURY

Following is the full text of the Grand Jury report at Tuesday's meeting of the Supreme Court. Charlottetown, P. E. I. Queens County Jan. 14, 1930.

Chief Justice Matheson, And Associate Judges. Your Lordships,—

We the members of the Grand Jury report as follows:

We have appointed Constables and Fence Viewers as per list attached.

We visited Falconwood Hospital and found everything in a very satisfactory condition, and feel we should compliment the officers and attendants on their efficiency. We would strongly recommend a number of additional fire escapes on the building;—also the main stairways be replaced with reinforced concrete.

It was brought to our attention Mr. Abraham Bonnell the Supervisor, who has served this institution faithfully for sixty-six years at a small salary, is arriving at the age when it will be necessary for him to retire, and we strongly recommend that provision be made for a suitable retiring allowance.

We next inspected the Infirmary which we found to be in an excellent condition, clean and home like and the inmates comfortable and happy.

Then we inspected the Queen's County Jail, and found it much overcrowded. There being 39 persons, 33 male and 6 female, when in reality there is accommodation for not more than 30.

We were informed two of the males are suffering from venereal disease and there are no facilities for their isolation. The food was of good quality, and the jail as clean as could be expected under the overcrowded conditions.

We also found two windows in the basement where articles could be passed in and communication held with the prisoners from outside. It would appear a suitable fence is essential.

There are also six cells in the basement which have been condemned. These might be changed and the space used for living quarters.

We would congratulate your Lordships and our people of Queen's County that no criminal cases have been brought before us.

LATE MARKET NEWS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—(Produce)—An extremely dull butter market, together with adequate supplies failed to change prices on the Montreal produce markets today. New Zealand butter was still quoted up to 37 3-4 cents a pound with wholesale prices at 37 cents for carlots. Storage eggs are beginning to become scarce and the end of the season is in sight.

British Columbia is showing an increase in fresh egg production and American fresh eggs are being brought here to supply the demand. Prices are unchanged. The cheese market showed slightly firmer tone. Prices ranging from 18 3-4 cents a pound for Quebecs, 19 1-4 cents for Ontarios to 21 cents for summer makes. The potato market was slightly easier, New Brunswick Green Mountains being quoted at \$1.95 per 90 pounds in bulk in carlots ex track here. No Prince Edward Island potatoes are offered. Dealers report no change in the poultry market, prices remaining firm. Prices on the cash grain market were reduced 1 cent to 2 cents per bushel today.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—(Eggs)—The final report of cold storage holdings in Canada on January 1st, 1930, issued by the Dominion Bureau, statistics give the quantity of eggs on hand as 862,349 dozen as compared to 2,591,323 dozen on January 1st, 1929. Poultry holdings for the first month were 11,740,155 pounds as compared to 9,280,788 pounds a year ago.

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—This egg market continues easy and unchanged with the undertone weaker; exports particularly are hard to move and brokers are finding difficulty in disposing of this grade for more than 55 cents delivered.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—(Eggs)—Receipts here today were 1,512 cases as compared to 1,921 cases on the corresponding day a year ago. Prices are unchanged today, but the undertone is weaker with receipts of both United States and local fresh heavier.

Turnip shipments were about the same as those of 1929 approximately 100,000 cwt.

Following is a list of the commodities exported and their values:—

Includes Lams (live) \$32,057, Poultry (live) \$41,379, Smelts (fresh frozen) \$47,720, Canned lobsters \$212,238, Beef hides \$11,491, Silver fox furs \$86,363, Table stock potatoes \$940,835, Seed potatoes \$1,868,610, Turnips \$177,234, Blueberries (fresh frozen) \$25,677, Grass seed \$21,183, Live lobsters \$14,404, Salt mackerel \$21,341, Hooked rugs \$13,524, Miscellaneous items \$7,555.

Total \$3,561,016. It will be noted that the increase for 1929 over the year previous was chiefly due to the increased quantity of potatoes shipped as well as the increased price.

WATER SHIPMENTS

During the season 276,000 bushels were shipped to Havana, Cuba, by water, direct. This does not include Island potatoes shipped from St. John or other ports. 1,262,476 bushels of seed and table stock were shipped by vessel to New York and to Norfolk, Va. 25,000 bushels of turnips were also shipped.
