COMPONENT PARTS SECOND CONTINGENT

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—Instructions issued by the militia department covering the composition of the second contingent call for three artillery brigades, consisting, all told, of nine batteries of 12 pounders, four guns to the battery, distributed as follows:—

There will also be one battery of heavy artillery. Each battery will include 150 men. Army service corps, four companies of 88 men each, recruited at Halifax, Monreal, Winnipeg and Victoria.

Army medical corps, three companies, one from Montreal, one from Toronto, and one divided between Winnipeg, Calgary and Victoria.

Field engineers, two companies, numbering 220 men, headquarters at Ottawa, and recruited from all centres.

There will also be a bicycle corps, signal corps, communication unit, divisional ammunition park, supply column, butchery, bakery and various supply units recruited from all centres.

The infantry regulations were issued some time ago, calling for fifteen battalions, only eight of them to go forward with the second contingent.

FEW LEFT IN TURKEY.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Inquiries in missionary circles in London revealed little apprehension that there have been anti-Christian risings in Turkey, or that English or American missionaries there have to date, at least, suffered anything save great difficulty in receiving remittances forwarded to them. For this reason ever since the outbreak of war with Germany, English missionaries have been withdrawn from Turkey, especially from Palestine, where the majority of English missionary work in the Mussulman Empire is being done. Out of the normal European force in Palestine of more than 125, there are today known to be hardly ten in Palestine. The remainder were either at home on summer furloughs and have not been allowed to go back, or have in the past few months made their way to England or to Egypt. As early as September 1st the Church Missionary Society authorized Cook's agent to proceed from Cairo to Jerusalem gathering together English missionaries and making arrangements for their return. For the past three days telegraphic communication with Turkey has been interrupted and for a long period letters have been getting through irregularly. It is for these reasons not known here just how missionaries in Palestine and other parts of Asiatic Turkey are prepared to meet the present crisis, but from the last direct information missionaries working in the district from Beirut to Antioch were in no danger and experiencing no exceptional inconveniences.

SIR WILLIAM OTTER IS OFFERED CONTROL OF PRISONERS.

OTTAWA, November 8.—The first application of the law compelling the registration of people of alien nationality is to be at Montreal. At Saturday's cabinet council an order was passed proclaiming that city as a place where registration will be established and appointing Silas P. Carpenter as registrar in charge of the official bureau.

In the ordinary course as prescribed by the order-in-council, all Germans and Austrians not naturalized must register and the registrar will determine who, if any, may be permitted to leave the country, and who will be paroled, that is to say, allowed freedom by reporting once a week, and those who will be interned.

From the experience at Montreal an idea will be formed with reference to the practical working out of the scheme generally and the number that it will be necessary to apprehend throughout the country.

Registration bureaus will be similarly established at Ottawa, Winnipeg, Sydney, Port William, Regina, Edmonton and Vancouver.

General Sir William Otter, of Toronto, retired inspector-general of the Canadian militia and commandant of the First Contingent to South Africa, is the officer the government has in view to direct the interning of prisoners of war of such Germans and Austrians in Canada as it may be necessary to detain. General Otter was here on Saturday and was tendered the appointment by the minister of Justice, and while it has not yet officially announced, it is believed it will be accepted. He is regarded as peculiarly fitted for the direction of such work.

The cabinet has had under advisement some tentative plans in regard to the interning of aliens, but they will not be adopted finally until the director of the work is appointed and consulted in regard to the matter.

Internment is not to be in jails or public institutions of that sort, but probably in concentration camps or grounds. In part at least, the idea of utilizing the labor of these people in western parts is likely to be followed. They would remove fallen timber, a work that is desirable but which otherwise might not be undertaken at this stage.

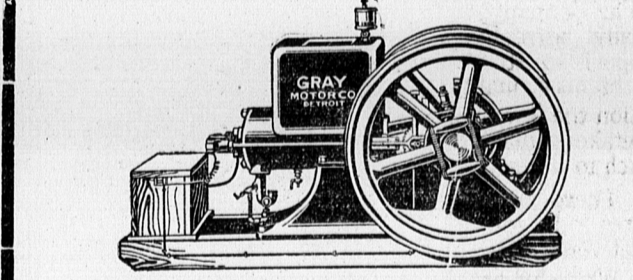

Notice Regarding Dressing Hogs

As a result of Government Inspection it is absolutely necessary that more attention be given to dressing hogs for market in order to avoid refusal by Inspectors.

They insist that the head, ears and feet should be thoroughly cleaned, every hair removed, the carcass carefully washed and kept perfectly clean when handling.

Some few farmers are not splitting the hogs between the hams and are leaving the bung gut—and in some cases even the manure—in. This must be remedied also, and in future a reduction of 2 lbs. per hog will be made on all hogs reaching here dressed in this manner, as to say the least it does not look well. Hogs must be split down completely, and bung gut and refuse removed.
