He then presented Mr. Boothroyd with a valuable purse. The pastor replied briefly and feelingly saying, as he thanked the people for their loving kindness, that he was glad to have been the pastor at the time of the great consummation of the Church Union, that some of his best friends anywhere were members of that church (Trinity). He was grateful that during the past year he had the joy of receiving in the church on profession of faith thirty eight new members, mostly adults. The address was as follows: Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Dear Sir, We would indeed be ungrateful did we fail to appreciate your own and Mrs. Boothroyd's many good works during your stay amongst us. We believe that Summerside is the better for your faithful service and example and on your departure you are leaving very many warm friends behind you. During the past year you have had many problems to solve and in handling those your tact and your courtesy have been beyond praise. Your Christian conduct in very trying circumstances has been perhaps the greatest sermon anyone could preach. We now ask you to kindly accept this gift for yourself and Mrs. Boothroyd as a small token of appreciation from the congregation of Trinity United Church. 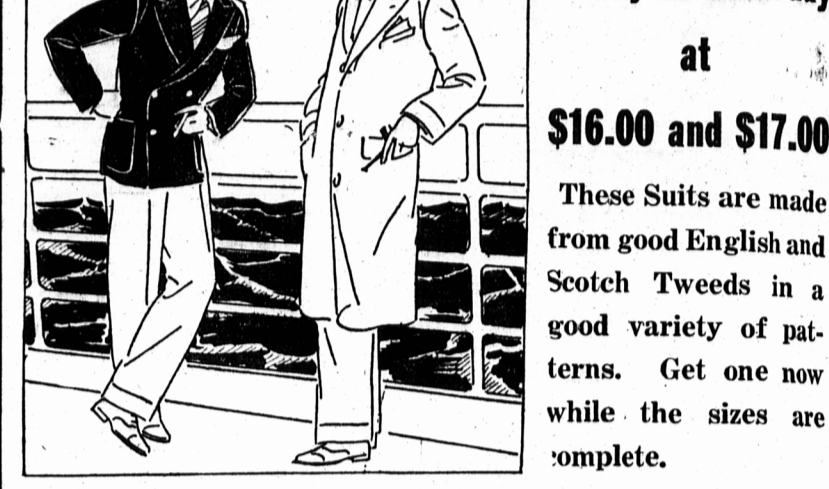
