In an extended notice an exchange, devoting some columns to Princeps 536, a noted son of Woodford Mambrino, (2.21) the following appears: "The most successful son of Princeps 536 as a progenitor of standard performers is Princeton (2.19), that is now credited with 16 trotters and 12 pacers with standard records; also with seven sons that have sired 39 standard performers, 30 of which are pacers; and with 18 daughters that have produced 30 with standard records, 17 of which are trotters. This makes 42 trotters and 55 pacers, 97 in all, of the descendants of Princeps 536. His dam was Reina Victoria (also dam of Muscovite (2.18) and two other trotters in the list), by Hambletonian 10; second dam, Hyacinthe (dam of Mecca, p. 2.19), by Volante 35, and third dam the great brood mare Clara (dam of the renowned old-time champion trotter Dexter (2.17), etc.), by Seely's American Star 14."

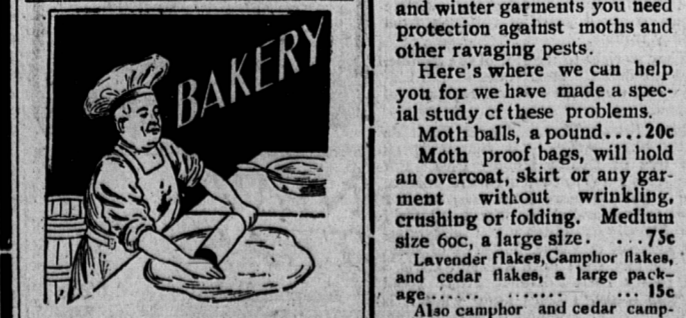
