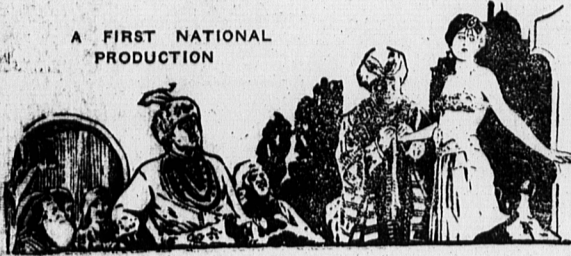

TOPICS OF THE DAY AND PATHE REVIEW

CHARLIE CHAPLIN VISITING LONDON

Declined to See Callers, and Spent Part of Day at Father's Grave.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—Charlie Chaplin was "out" to all callers yesterday afternoon. He went visiting instead. He disappeared from his palatial suite at the Ritz, disconcerting admiring thousands who had packed the streets in the hope of catching a glimpse of the famous smile. He eluded the throng by sauntering out the back door of the hotel.

OTTAWA NATIONAL GALLERY REOPENS.

After five and a half years the doors of the Ottawa National Gallery of Canada reopened on Monday. The country's art possessions have been homeless since February, 1916, when fire destroyed the Parliament Buildings. Almost overnight the pictures were taken down from the walls of the seven or eight galleries in Victoria Memorial Museum and with the sculpture went into hastily constructed store rooms. Fortunately for the country at large they were not allowed to remain there, for in the six years when there was no National Gallery to visit in Ottawa, the pictures have travelled to every city and town of consequence in the Dominion, having been loaned for exhibition in colleges, libraries, and other public places. It is really a new National Gallery that is being reopened next week. The building, as well as the pictures and sculpture, has been entirely rearranged and to much better advantage.

With his arm linked in that of Donald Crisp and a bodyguard, Chaplin strolled down fashionable Piccadilly unnoticed by the hordes hurrying towards the Ritz. Just as Fairbanks eluded the crowds in order to see a tailor, so did Chaplin. He joined the throng of admirers who were shouting as loud as they could for the appearance of their movie idol.

The Gallery is now almost completely separated from the museum, and has its main entrance on the Elgin street side. Even before 1916 the National Gallery had outgrown its accommodation, and the scheme of restoration has added considerably to the space, although already with the acquisitions of the intervening years, the room is left for future expansion. The ground floor of the east wing has been converted into a sculpture court. The second, third and fourth floors have been rearranged to make some 15 picture and print galleries. The east wing has been separated from the rest of the building by fireproof partitions so that the gallery now controls its own heating and ventilation.

Americas Film Company Sues Japanese Firm

TOKIO, Sept. 14.—The test of the copyright of the moving pictures in Japan is being followed with keen interest here in proceedings brought by the Metro Film Co., of America against the Nippon Katsudo Shashin Kaisha.

There are no arrangements between Japan, and other countries by which copyright of the movies may be protected and complaints from foreign film manufacturers have been many.

It is alleged that the Nippon Katsudo Shashin has been giving an exhibition of a reproduction of a Metro film under a Japanese name without obtaining the permission of the film concern. If the plain-tiff wins, Japanese cinema people will no longer be able to show foreign films without first obtaining permission of the manufacturer.

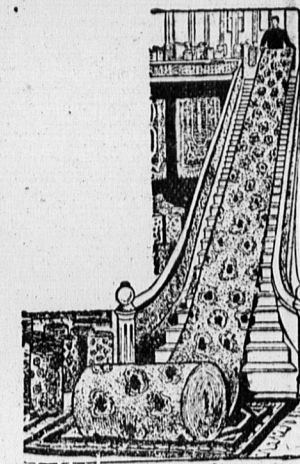
