NEW LANGUAGE FOR THE AVIATOR.

A Londoner has written to the Pall Mall Gazette urging the necessity of devising new verbs and substantives for the use of air sailors. He objects to "aviate," "aviator" and "a string of clumsy variations from the same root."

There is already a verb "to bird" in English, and although it is rare, it is not obsolete. It means to pursue bird catching or fowling. The verb "to bird off," "pick off" with a musket, etc. (as a sportsman a bird), is obsolete, as the new English dictionary informs us.

Would the Englishman call a female air sailor a birdie, and without thought of endearment; or a young air sailor a birdling; a collection of aeroplanes, balloons, etc., a birdery; a single one a bird cage? The only tobacco allowed to be smoked in the air should, of course be birds-eye.

In English slang "to bird" is to thief, steal, look for plunder, and it is as old as Ben Johnson.

ANOTHER DRESS SUIT TRAGEDY.

TIVERTON, R. I., Oct. 12.—The finding of the severed legs of a woman in a suit case, among the bushes in an outlying section of this town, brought to light what the authorities are convinced is murder. The discovery of a New Bedford newspaper of yesterday's date with portions of the limbus in the suit case is regarded as the most important clue thus far obtained, indicating possibly the place of murder.

THE FISHERIES CASE.

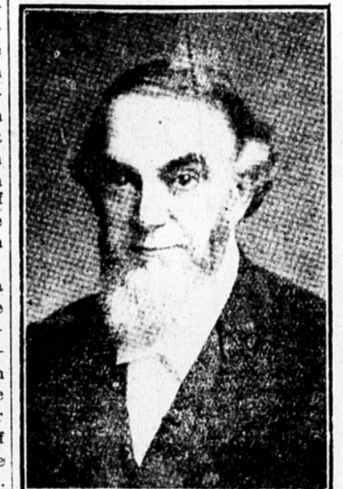
The case of Great Britain in the Newfoundland fishery dispute, and that of the United States, have both been prepared. A Washington despatch points out that this is the first case between the United States and Great Britain to be referred to The Hague court for arbitration under the general arbitration treaty of April 4, 1908. In four months the counter cases of each government will be exchanged and two months later the entire matter will be submitted to The Hague, which will meet in April next to hear arguments.

The issues involved are due chiefly to disagreements which have arisen between the two governments as to the intent and meaning of the provisions of Article 1 of the Treaty of 1818. Seven specific questions are submitted for the arbitration of the court. The first relates to whether fishing regulations promulgated by Newfoundland are justifiable. The second question is whether American fishermen have a right to employ as members of the fishing crews of their vessels persons who are not inhabitants of the United States. The third question is designed to test the validity of Newfoundland regulations, which require American fishermen to report at customs houses and to pay harbor or other duties or similar requirements. The Hague court is also asked to define where the "three marine miles" must be measured. A decision is also requested as to whether American fishermen have a right to fish on that part of the southern coast of Newfoundland which extends from Cape Ray to Rameau islands or on the western and northern coast of Newfoundland from Cape Ray to the Quirpon islands, or on the Magdalen islands.

Dr Heinrich Lammasch of Austria will act as president of the Hague tribunal. The members of the tribunal are Louis M. Drago of the Argentine Republic, A. F. De Savornin Lohman of the Netherlands, Judge George Gray of Delaware, and Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, chief justice of the supreme court of Canada. The British case was prepared by the Hon. A. D. Aylesworth, minister of justice of Canada.—Ex.

LESSON IN FRUIT PACKING. The Co-operative Fruit Company are planning to pack apples in the Connolly warehouse, Sydney Street West, on Friday and Saturday next. This will give an opportunity for people who have early apples on hand to have them packed according to the Fruit Marks Act and marketed. All apples brought in to be packed should be carefully picked and brought in in such conveyance as not to be bruised. It is hoped that every fruit grower in the vicinity having Fall apples for sale will bring them in and have them packed.
