ASSISTANCE TO FARMERS

In order to encourage farmers to use cleaner and better seed for the year's crop, the Department of Agriculture is prepared to bonus the purchase of hand-grading machines costing not over sixty dollars (\$60.00) to the extent of twenty-five per cent of the cost price, providing that such purchase is made by a group of farmers of not less than five (5) individuals. Bona fide statements covering cost of purchase must be submitted along with the names of the farmers composing the group. The Department will give every assistance in rendering information to ward effective purchasing of machines, seed grain supplies and other details of profitable grain growing.

The Department is also prepared to assist in the extension of barley growing by supplying for cash only No. 1 Island two-rowed seed barley at a cost price delivered at any local station on Prince Edward Island of one dollar per bushel. Orders for this valuable seed should be placed promptly.

Arrangements have also been made with companies supplying ground limestone through which the Department pays the companies eighty cents per ton and the latter delivered to any station on Prince Edward Island the ground material at a price of three dollars per ton in bulk and three dollars and seventy-five cents in bags. Orders should be sent direct to the companies and not through the Department of Agriculture.

Assistance will be given to poultry producers by paying one-half the cost of brooder stoves in cases where breeders build or re-construct, during the present season, brooder houses that will pass the inspection of an official recognized by the Department.
