Report Of Commissioners Of Sewers And Water Supply

Submitted At City Council Annual Meeting

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council: Gentlemen: The season that we have just passed through has been the most trying one in the history of the Water Department.

Over seventy acres of land were purchased at the source of supply and arrangements were made with six different land owners for allowing the pipe to pass through their property between Brackley Point Road and the reservoir.

Early in September when work was first started on the new pipe line, the Department sent out an urgent appeal for citizens to economize in the use of water and stated that we expected to have the new supply available about the first of December. Water was actually turned into the reservoir on the evening of December 2nd. Only one leak was discovered in the entire four miles and that in a defective pipe which was repaired in a day.

Water Shortage First Noticed

The first sign of a possible shortage in the then existing water supply was noticed about 1920. Between the year 1920 and 1925 the North River source was developed through the drilling of additional wells to almost twice its original capacity. An entirely new source of supply was first suggested in a report submitted to the Council in January, 1925.

Expenditure on New System

Approximately \$90,000 dollars have been expended this year on the Brackley system. The final payments on several of the contracts have yet to be made, but the entire cost of the Brackley development, including all preliminary expenses, surveys, tests and land damages will not exceed \$110,000, which is well below the estimate.

Apart from the work on the new supply, the following extensions and additions were made to the distribution system during the year: Ambrose street, 292 feet 6" water main and 8" sewer main, McGill Avenue, 386 feet water and 8" sewer main. Two new hydrants were placed and three manholes built.

Thirty four buildings were connected with the sewerage system during the year, twenty three of these connections were to old buildings. Twenty four water services were laid to dwellings, stores, etc. The total number of water services now laid to buildings is 2,936 and the total number of buildings connected with sewerage 1,872.

One hundred thousand dollars Water Works debentures were issued to cover this year's expenditure. These debentures are for a term of thirty years and bear interest at the rate of four and one half percent per annum. They were purchased by the Royal Securities at 96.73.

The balance in the Bank of Nova Scotia to the credit of Water Construction Account is \$4,052.96. In favour of House Connections Account \$88.84, while the Sewerage Construction Account is overdrawn \$1,240.17. No sewerage debentures having been issued during the year.

Seven hundred orders were issued by the office during the year for turning on and off water due to tenants moving. At the close of the year there are 2,860 dwellings, stores, etc., using water supplied by this Department, 2,350 or about 82 percent of these are connected with the sewerage system.

Meat And Milk Inspector's Report

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council, Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year 1930.

Meat Inspection

Meat is inspected on Market days, (Tuesdays and Fridays) in the market building. The meat which is brought there is generally in a satisfactory condition. The interior of the market is kept in good condition by the Market Clerk.

Meat is inspected at the stores of all meat dealers on Market days and as often as is required during the week. Some butchers kill their meat in their own slaughter houses within the city limits where it is inspected. Most of the meat is killed in slaughter houses outside the city limits.

The following were condemned during the year as unfit for human consumption and destroyed: Parasitic, 39 portions of carcasses; Pyaemia, 19 portions of carcasses; Emaciation 1 carcass; Bruise, 3 portions of carcasses.

Meat offered for sale in the city is remarkably free of disease. No tuberculosis was found during the year.

Milk Inspection

During the year 383 samples of milk and 42 samples of cream were analysed for butter fat, total milk solids, milk solids, not fat, specific gravity, number of bacteria per c. c., acidity, dilutions and preservatives. Two samples were found to be below the required percentage of butter fat, and fifty four contained sediment. No preservatives or dilutions were found.

Dairy Inspection

Fifty dairy farms were inspected during the year. The stables were inspected for cleanliness, light, and ventilation; the yards for stagnant water, dirt and drainage; the water supply for location; the milk house for sanitation; the milking utensils, bottles, etc., for cleanliness and method of use in washing and sterilizing. All dairy farms were passed this year. Quite an appreciable improvement has been made in the condition of the premises of milk vendors since 1929.

New milk houses were built, stables repaired, yards kept cleaner and better drained. However, there are some whose premises require some improvement in their stables and milk houses. We hope to find these improvements made when we visit their premises next summer.

The Condensed Milk Co., and the Pure Milk Co., were visited once a month during the year and found satisfactory. I wish to thank Chief of Police Birwhistle and officers for collecting the milk. I have the honor to be, Sirs, Your obedient servant I. E. CROKEN, V. S. Meat and Milk Inspector

Profit In Hogs

With hog feeding the most profitable proposition on our farms at the present time, due to low feed prices and relatively high hog prices, every farmer should hold all hogs until they reach the maximum "Select" weight of 220 lbs. off cars, or 230 lbs. at country loading points. At present prices there is no more profitable way of marketing grain and low grade potatoes than by feeding hogs. For this reason the hogs fed to

large metered customers greatly curbed their consumption, our maintenance and operating account shows an increased revenue from every source of nearly eight hundred dollars over last year, while expenditure increased in only one item, viz: coal and supplies for the main station due to continuous operation of the pumps for a considerable portion of the

year. Fourteen other items of expenditure show a decrease in each item. The amount paid over to the city was fifteen thousand eight hundred and eighty eight dollars and twenty two cents, which is a slight increase over 1929.

Following is a comparative statement of revenue for the years 1929 and 1930:

Seven thousand, five hundred and forty eight dollars and twenty five cents of the above was from metered services.

The pumping record shows 583,644,490 gallons of water pumped to the city during the year, or an average daily consumption of 1,599,025 gallons. 1,022 tons of coal were consumed.

The usual testing and flushing of hydrants gates sewers, etc., has been carefully attended to.

Annual Meeting Of The Trinity United Church

White, D. D., occupied the chair at both meetings. St. John's Church held their meeting in the Parish Hall and was well represented. A substantial balance in the current and savings account was shown in the treasurer's report. The different organizations brought in their reports, which were very encouraging, especially the Women's Auxiliary. The Church wardens were all re-elected. Mr. A. W. Tanton was appointed as a delegate to the Synod. D. C. S. delegates were Major F. May, Horace Andrew, Benjamin Pillmen. Among matters discussed at the meeting were the "Every member Canvass" for the envelope system of collection; also the centenary celebration of the church which will take place on the second Sunday in July. The original church was built in 1831. This will be a momentous occasion in the history of the Church. Reference was made to the honour which was bestowed upon the rector of Doctor of Divinity, an honour of which the whole Church could be justly proud. Dr. White replied to these remarks in a very feeling manner.

St. Mary's Annual Meeting

On Monday evening, St. Mary's Church had their annual meeting at which there was a representative gathering. Very encouraging reports were brought in from the various committees. The finances of the Church were satisfactory, as was shown by the treasurer's report. The financial statement showed a balance of \$160.45. The budget for the current year was \$2,046.10. The vestry for the year is as follows: Messrs. J. J. Enman, J. W. Lecky, Dr. E. T. Tanton, Ernest Mills, T. H. S. Jackson, George Kay, James Prichard, Lee Horne; Wardens, Dr. E. T. Tanton and T. H. S. Jackson; Vestry Clerk, Lee Horne; delegate to Synod, Ernest Hallett; delegates to D. C. S., Lee Horne and V. Milligan and J. J. Enman. Sideman Mr. M. L. Frank MacKenzie. Mr. Penwarden was re-appointed organist of the Church and a vote of thanks was extended to him for his faithful services; also to Mr. Milligan. The hall committee are Dr. E. T. Tanton, H. M. Downing and Lee Horne; Secy, Treas., Louis Romkie. The hall funds allowed for the drawing of three bonds of \$200 each an interest which will be paid to the holders of the bonds. The W. A. report showed that organization to be in a flourishing condition and also the Sunday School, which has done very well this year and has a \$1,000.00 balance to their credit in the bank. The Junior W. A. also had a very good report. A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. M. L. Frank MacKenzie for his faithful service to the Church, especially in welcoming strangers to the church. Mr. MacKenzie moved that a resolution be passed conveying to Dr. White the sentiments of the congregation in regard to the honour recently conferred upon him at King's College, where he was given the degree of Doctor of Divinity. This motion was seconded by Dr. Tanton, who said that both parishes had benefited by this honour and also the whole Island. The meeting closed with prayer by the rector.—S.

Police Report

To His Worship the Mayor and members of the City Council.

Your Worship and Gentlemen:— Re Annual Police Report, 1930.

I have the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report of the City Police Force for the year ended December 31st, 1930.

The present strength of the Force consists of a Chief, two Sergeants and five Constables being a decrease of one man. On August 31st last Constable J. J. Trainor resigned from the Force in connection with his appointment as Commissioner of the P. E. Island Provincial Police Force. Law and Order has been fully maintained by the Force at its present strength, but I think it advisable to appoint another Constable early this coming Spring.

During the year under review eight hundred and fifty eight cases were entered and disposed of in the City Police Court, an increase of twenty three cases over the previous year. There was a total absence of Crime of a serious nature. We experienced a few instances of Shopbreaking, but with one exception the offenders were apprehended and convicted and four were sentenced to serve long terms in Dorchester Penitentiary. The arrests made amounted to five hundred and sixty four, an increase of one hundred and one over the previous year, by far the highest record of arrests effected in this City over such a period. There were 358 arrests for Drunkenness, an increase of 41; 74 for vagrancy, an increase of 48; and 24 arrests for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, an increase of 10.

There was another marked increase in the Motor Vehicle traffic, and this may be gauged from the fact that in addition to the expanding tourist traffic the Registration of motor vehicles in this Province for 1930 increased by over 1,200 while another large increase can be anticipated this year. Although the vehicular traffic during the past year was the heaviest experienced, there was no congestion, and our parking zones were equal to all demands. We investigated 65 traffic accidents, the majority being collisions between motor cars at the intersection of streets. It is again pleasing to note that accidents of a serious nature were few, and we had but one fatal, in this instance a child, in the act of running across a street, being struck by a passing car. The driver was exonerated from blame by a Coroner's Jury. Prosecutions under the Highway Traffic Act and City Traffic By-law totalled 113, a decrease of twenty-two compared with the previous year.

The Police Patrol car has now been in use, day and night, since June, 1928. The speedometer registers 27,778 miles, the mileage for past year being 8,851. This car is still in good serviceable condition.

During the year we assisted the Prohibition Officers in 154 searches of premises suspected of the unlawful sale or possession of intoxicating liquors. 53 Prosecutions were entered in the City Police Court, resulting in 73 Convictions and 72 dismissals. This is a decrease of 15 Prosecutions compared with the year 1929.

During the year we collected 803 samples of milk and 42 of cream

from Licensed Milk Vendors and Store-keepers, for test by the City Analyst. Thirty-five Prosecutions were entered under the City By-law respecting Milk and Milk Vendors, a Conviction being recorded and Fine imposed in every case. In 33 of these prosecutions the Milk contained sediment, and in the other two cases the Milk was low in butter fat. This is an increase of 14 Convictions over the previous year.

The 564 arrests made during the past year were for the following classified offences:—
