LOU NEMIS TO BATTLE OCTOBER 17

SYDNEY, Oct. 10.—The bout scheduled for October 24th between Johnny Nemis and Joe Brown, of Detroit, has been indefinitely postponed, through an order by Nemis' doctor that he will be unable to fight for another month at least. Injuries to Nemis' arm in his fight with McKenna were more serious than first thought, the doctor says. However, on Wednesday, October 17, the Police Club is endeavoring to bring together Lou Nemis and Cliff Graham of Toronto. Graham is one of the best lightweights in Canada and has beaten Chris Newton several times. Last week Graham won the semi-final to the Belanger-Rocco bout in Toronto.

Marriner Wins

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Fighting with a broken right hand, Les Marriner, former University of Illinois heavyweight, won a decision over George Gemas of Philadelphia in a slashing ten-round bout at the Peoria Auditorium last night. Marriner fought a game battle and 3080 spectators gave him a great ovation for his courage. The injury, which came in the third round, after Marriner had been floored twice, each time for counts of nine, merely acted as a spark to ignite his fighting instinct. Eleven times the Philadelphiaan was floored by the ferocious Marriner. After his hand was broken, the fight was his right and this puzzled Gemas. In the eighth round Gemas was down six times, and in the final round was all but out. As a result of his injury, Marriner will be forced out of the ring for possibly two months, necessitating the cancellation of five bouts. Marriner weighed 190 pounds, Gemas 191.

CITY LIABLE FOR ICY SIDE-WALKS

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 10.—In his reasons for the judgment awarded Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy of Eganville, \$2,500 damages against the City of Ottawa, over a fall on an icy sidewalk, Mr. Justice McEvoy admits Ottawa has climatic conditions, as well as many streets with serious grades to contend with. These do not excuse the city from liability, however, if the scheme devised months ago is not efficiently carried out or if officials responsible do not fulfill their duties, he said.

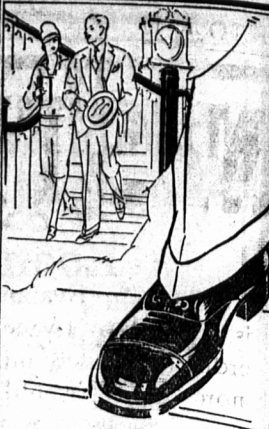

Grattan Bars Not Likely to Race Again

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 10.—The harness turf doubtless has seen the last of the sensational Canadian Pacer, Grattan Bars, 1.59 1-2. The horse has been retired for the season by his owner, Fred Throver of Kerwood, Ont., because of lameness that resulted from a training workout at the Syracuse Grand Circuit meeting and the retirement is extremely likely to be permanent in view of Throver's announcement earlier in the campaign that the son of Grattan Royal would enter the ranks of preponeers next year.

Grattan Bars leaves the track with the distinction of being the largest money-winning pacer for one season in history and the only performer that has captured three \$25,000 events. His earnings total close to the \$50,000 mark. His \$25,000 conquests resulted in the New England Derby, American Derby and Page Dairy at the Windsor, Conn., Kalamazoo and Toledo courses respectively.

His best record is 1.59 1-2, made in the Pace Classic and equalled in the American Derby. He was expected to lower his mark against the stretch at Lexington, Ky., this Christmas of the Newton stables, Newton, Mass., dropping a heat to the best in the land, including the late yearling, Capt. Harvey (Kelley), who was second; Ram-dell Direct, (Foye), third; Rambolier (Small) fourth. Best time, 2:13 1-2. Lukebelle, unbeaten this year, stepping Belle Havesworth, three driven and ran away. Luke Bell also smashed the Topsham track records for both trotting and pacing with his 2:07 1-4 mile, the only mark being 2:09 3-4, made last year by Bessie McKlyo and Silver King.

And Throver's faith in his horse was substantiated. Grattan Bars was undefeated this season and he beat the best in the land, including Winnipeg, 1.59 1-4, who has turned out to be the fastest mile of the year, stakes. He finally secured it from twice.

FRANK FOX HAS BIG DAY AT FALL FAIR

TOPSHAM, Maine, Oct. 10.—The Sagadahoc country fair, a famous event marking the closing of the racing season in Maine, and a general gathering of campaigners from all over the state and beyond opened today, with the usual big crown with fast track and with nearly every heat a whipping finish.

Frank P. Fox, 74-year-old reinisman, had one of the biggest days of his career when he took the 2:12 trot with Lukebelle, unbeaten this year, stepping the last mile in 2:07 1-4, equalling the Maine track record for trotter, made by the same horse several weeks ago. He beat a classy field, including the Portland gelding Bluejay, 2:08 1-2, driven by Billy Flemming; Chestnut Dillon, of the Flemming stable, driven by Red Hanifen, and the Boston mare Belle Harvest field, in order. Time 2:09, 2:12 1-2, 2:07 1-4.

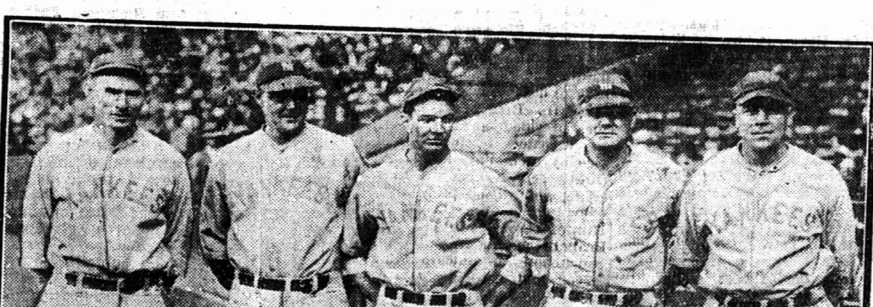

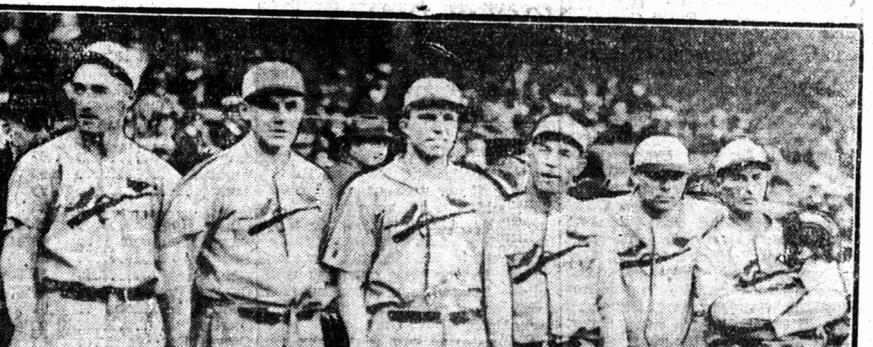

PEDDLERS MAY GET LICENSE

MONTREAL, QUE., Oct. 10.—Special Licenses for peddlers, costing \$100 a year, which have been refused by the city since May last, may be available again shortly if the executive committee carries out a project for reinstating this kind of permit.

The licenses at \$100 are required by those who go from door to door selling merchandise such as cloth domestic utensils, etc. They were suspended by the executive in a number of commercial associations here, members of which alleged that operators, particularly of peddlers who represented houses selling direct to the customer were embarrassing them in their business; and they considered that the door-to-door traffic was not bearing taxation in proportion to that assumed by anyone setting up a store and paying the various taxes in which regular merchants are liable. It seems to be the case, after investigation that the city merchant in the last analysis suffers little from peddling.
