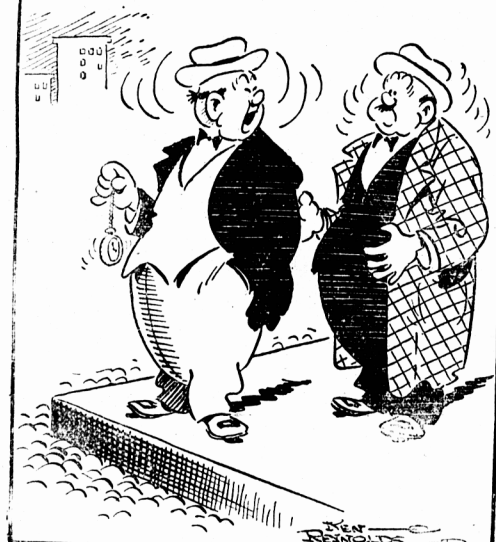

Eastern Y.P.U. Fall Rally

A rally of the Young People's Unions of the Eastern Presbytery was held in Central United Church, Dunstons, Friday, Oct. 13th. The afternoon session opened at 3:30 p.m. with the singing of hymns and the offering of prayer.

The delegates were then welcomed to Central United Church by the president of the Eastern Y.P.U., Miss Norma Jenkins. Mr. Fulton Robertson, Hunter River, replied to the address of welcome.

The Presbytery President, Mrs. Ralph Raynor, Mt. Herbert, then took charge of the business. Mrs. Kimball MacKay was appointed secretary for the day. The following committees were appointed: Nominations, Rev. Roy Vessey, Mrs. L.M. Murray and Mrs. Ralph Raynor, who were to appoint two officers to fill vacancies on the executive.

The resolutions committee consisted of Rev. W. T. Mercer, Mr. Fulton Robertson, Mrs. Norma Jenkins and Mr. Ralph Raynor. The Misses Mercer and Underhay were the secretaries.

The group was then divided into two study groups on the topic, "The Church and the Post-War World." The leaders, Rev. J. A. Nicholas and Rev. D. W. MacPherson made these groups very helpful and interesting. The findings of these groups were:

(1) Spiritualism must enter into the economic system. (2) The duty of the church is to instill the spirit of Christ, and begin with the community, the homes and the schools. (3) Instill an incentive—the love for Christ, through prayer. (4) The urging of Y.P. groups to make a study of prayer, and that small groups be formed to carry out the prayers. (5) The urging of the study of the "Statement of Faith" from "The Highways of the Heart," so that young people may know what they believe so as to instill the incentive to prayer. (6) The stressing of Christian education in the schools.

Supper was served the delegates by the ladies of Central Y. P. U. Free time was then enjoyed before the evening session at 7:30. Members of Mt. Herbert Y. P. U. opened the meeting with a service of worship after which the guest speaker, Rev. W. S. Godfrey, B.A., Superintendent of Missions and Field Secy. of Christian Education Maritime Conference, was introduced by the honorary president, Rev. J. A. Nicholas. Rev. Mr. Godfrey's inspiring address was based on the theme of the Convention, "Consecration of Youth."

The business period followed. Minutes of the Sunday Rally were read and approved, also those of the afternoon session. The nominating committee presented the following report:

Convenor of Leadership Training—Annie MacKay, Charlottetown. Secy.—Norma Jenkins, Frenchfort. Rev. Mr. Mercer, chairman of Resolutions Committee read the following report:

(1) Resolved that we acknowledge our appreciation for the use of Central Church for our Fall Rally; also we are grateful to the ladies who so capably arranged the supper and as well to Rev. J. A. Nicholas and Rev. D.W. MacPherson for leading in the discussion groups.

(2) Resolved that the findings of the Study Group be included in the press report. (3) Resolved that members of Y. P. U. clip this report from the press and arrange with their Unions to have a special evening to discuss the findings, especially those of the study group.

(4) Whereas in many of our local congregations we have no organized weak groups for our young boys and girls, therefore be it resolved that wherever possible we encourage organization of Trail Ranger and C.G.T. groups, and that we as young people give leadership in these groups.

A report of the Maritime Conference held at Sackville July 11-19th was given by Miss Joan Howell. Rev. L. M. Murray spoke briefly about the Y. P. Camp at Marshfield. He pointed out that very few from the United Church had attended this past summer, and urged that we stress Camp and Conference in our local groups.

The roll call revealed a good representation of the various unions. To our past secy-treasurer, Mrs. (Rev.) Clark MacDonald, we extended our deep appreciation for her work with the Eastern Union. A gift in remembrance was given her from the Presbytery. Also to Rev. L. M. Murray will be absent from this Presbytery, an address was read and a small token presented.

MR. JOSEPH GARFIELD WHITEHEAD

Joseph Garfield Whitehead, aged 63, retired manager in the adjustment department of the T. Eaton Company, died Thursday evening, Nov. 28, at his residence 361 Victor St., Winnipeg.

Mr. Whitehead was born in Kensington, P. E. I., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Whitehead, and had been in Winnipeg for the past thirty-nine years. In 1908 he started with the T. 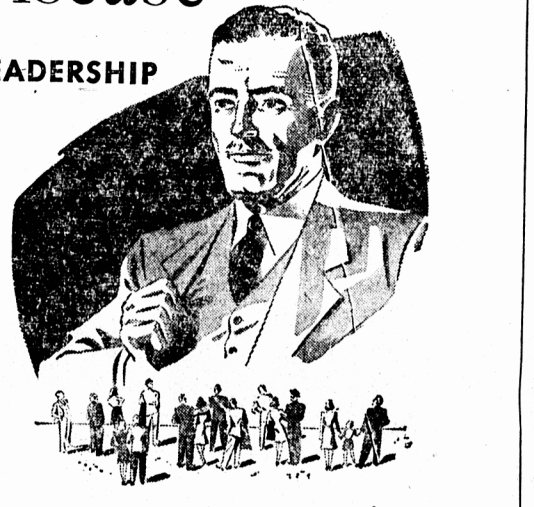
