MAJOR WISE HOME FOR VISIT.

—Major H. A. Wise, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wise of Milton, who has been on transport duty for the past year and a half, is spending a short holiday on the island, accompanied by his wife and little boy Ambrose. They are guests of Mrs. R. E. Mutch, sister of Major Wise. Previous to enlistment Major Wise resided in Winnipeg where he was engaged in the drug business. He enlisted in 1914 with the 90th Winnipeg Rifles, the "Little Black Devils," and served with this unit, as the 8th Bat-

talion, during the first two years of the war. He was recalled to Canada in 1916 and served as second in command of the 191st Battalion. Later, in 1917, he took command of the Composite Battalion of Winnipeg, thereafter being appointed officer in command of the conducting staff. He made 22 voyages across the Atlantic in charge of troops, many of the voyages being made during the submarine period. He transported about 50,000 troops in all without an accident, although not without experiences. On one voyage about 98 per cent. of

the troops on board were down at one time with the Spanish Flu, about ten per cent. of whom died. He arrived in Montreal last Thursday by the Donaldston Liner Saturnia with 2,000 troops. He expects to leave on the 23rd for Portland, Maine, whence he will return to England on the Hospital ship Araguaya.
