SOME HOPE FOR LEPERS

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Prince of Wales has become the patron of the British Leprosy Relief Association, the inaugural meeting of which will be held at the London Mansion Hotel, in January. Its vice-presidents are the Secretaries of State for Foreign Affairs, the Colonies, and India, the Viceroy of India, and the Governors-General of Canada and New Zealand. The committees list of honorary officials, include the names of many distinguished scientists, and Viscount Chelmsford, in a circular explaining the aims of the organizations, states that "leprosy can be stamped out in the greater part of the British Empire, probably within three decades." He adds: "Happily under improved methods of curative treatment now available, hundreds of lepers are recovering." Sir Leonard Rogers, late of the Indian Medical Service, has drawn up a memorandum of the medical policy of the association, in which the position as to the dread disease within the Empire is set out revealing the widespread nature of the problems with which it is proposed to deal. The secretary of the association, Mr. Frank Oldrieve, has spent many years working among lepers, especially in India, and when there during the cold season he saw 160 lepers who were undergoing the new treatment. "They were," he says "the jolliest, happiest crowd of sick people" he had ever come across. That settlement so full of

Agricultural Short Courses

The Agricultural Short Courses held by the Department of Agriculture at local centres during the past few weeks have met with a cordial reception in every case and have proven of reliable value to every district attended.

During last week two courses were held, one at Elmsdale and one at O'Leary and with good results, especially at Elmsdale where every meeting was well attended.

Mr. Myers the Commissioner of Agriculture attended both of these courses and gave a general talk on the Agricultural conditions of the Province and with some suggestions for improvement that might be instituted with little or no expense to the district in both cases he emphasized the benefit of co-operative action in doing much to the improvement of the dairy industry which is the main stay of our Province.

The speakers with their subjects are as follows: Messrs. W. J. Reid, on Live Stock and Dairying; W. J. Gibson on Feeding Dairy Cattle; C. J. Cook on Dairy Records and Potato Production; W. Boulter on Potato Growing and Co-operative Marketing and buying; S. G. Peppin on Fertilizers and Plant Diseases; A. R. Jones on Poultry Feeding and Marketing; H. W. Clay on Swine Grading and Marketing.

During this week two excellent courses have been held at Eldon and Flat River with record attendance at all sessions in each case.

At Eldon the Farmers' Institute was organized with 37 members and the district was contemplating organization in various lines of co-operative marketing.

The same speakers were in attendance as at the previous two courses with the addition of F. T. Morrow, Dominion Dairy Produce Grader, and J. A. Clark, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm.

Next week two Courses will be held at Georgetown and Montague and it is expected that the excellent progress of the work will be continued.

MARRIED FIFTY YEARS NOT PARTED BY DEATH

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Joseph and Margaret Dalia, 75 and 78, had been married more than fifty years. Death separated them today for only fifteen minutes. Four days ago neighbors found the two unconscious in the apartment at No. 155 Tompson Street, after a pot of coffee on the stove had boiled over and put out the gas. Early this morning a nurse tipped to Joseph's bed in Bellevue Hospital, and told him his wife was dead. A few minutes later Joseph smiled faintly and died.

hope, he contrasted with his daily experience, when ten years ago, he lived on a leper's island, and all that could be done for the poor people was to tend and care for them until they died. "There is hope now for almost every leper," he said.

"A friend of mine," has just written to me, that in those who have been treated and liberated on parole as symptom free, no indications have been found of the return of the disease." Speaking of the prevalence of the disease, he stated that the last census revealed 100,000 lepers in India, but he considered that there were perhaps, three times that number in the country. In the British possessions in Africa, there were probably 80,000 lepers. As to what has already been done, Mr. Oldrieve showed photographs of terrible disfigurements banished by the treatments which can now be given. At least \$1,000,000 will be needed if the campaign is to be fully effective.

MRS. (DR.) C. W. BLISS Amherst, Jan. 20.—After a prolonged illness, Fanny, wife of C. W. Bliss, M. D., passed away at an early hour this morning at their home, Church Street. The late Mrs. Bliss was the daughter of Rosara Ellen Casey and Silas Edwin Crane of Bale Verte, one of

the oldest and most highly respected families in that section. Her husband and the following children survive: Madeline, wife of Major M. A. Scovell, of Meadowlands, Georgetown, N. B.; Gwendolyn at home; Donald McE., a student at the Collegiate School, Rothsay, N. B., also three stepsons, Dr. Gerald, of Altoona, Penn.; Botstord, at home and Dennison in Maine. Mrs. Bliss was a prominent member of Christ's Church, and a generous worker for its support. She took an active part in the work of the Daughters of the Empire, being one of the first Regents. She was a woman greatly beloved by all, cultured, kind and with more than ordinary literary talent. One brother and one sister survive of a family of seven. William Crane and Mrs. Alice Crane Doty, both in California. The late Mrs. Bliss was a niece of Mrs. W. P. Doull of this city.

JAMES ROBERTSON

Once again the Angel of Death halted in its unceasing route to reclaim from our midst a kind and well respected citizen in the person of the late James Robertson. He had been ailing since the summer, suffering from rheumatism and later from pleurisy. But death came quite unexpectedly. He kept as usual up till a very few days before the end. Deceased was a sober, industrious, and trustworthy man. He is perhaps best described in the homely but meaningful phrase, "a good neighbor."

The late James Robertson was born in Cavendish, July 22nd, 1857. He was one of a large family born to the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Robertson, who lived just east of the Presbyterian Church. As a boy he attended school at Cavendish, and later worked on the farm at home. But the more staid life of the toiler at the plan was not to satisfy the youthful yearning for advent-

Arthur, St. Peter's, and Mrs. Nelson Orr, New Glasgow; besides his three children: Ethel, Mrs. J. M. Patterson, Brookline, Mass.; Charles of Houlam, Washington, U. S. A.; and Emily, Mrs. L. O. Currie, at home
