MONCTON, Oct. 2—Dr. William A. Ferguson, 74, prominent Moncton physician and surgeon, died at the family home, Alma Street, here this morning of pneumonia. His death removes one of Moncton's leading citizens and the news of his passing will be learned of with keen regret by many friends throughout the Maritimes.

Dr. Ferguson had been in ill-health for some time and early last summer he underwent a serious operation in New England Baptist Hospital at Boston. He recovered and returned home in July and soon after resumed his practice. Last Saturday he contracted a heavy cold and pneumonia developed.

Dr. Ferguson was born at Richibucto on April 3, 1856, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Ferguson. He received his early education in the public schools there and entered McGill University in 1881, receiving his B. A. there and continuing to study medicine at McGill under Sir William Osler. In 1884 he graduated with the degree of M. D., C. M. He served as a house surgeon under Dr. F. H. Shephard at Montreal General Hospital for some time and later went to Western Canada where he was employed by the Canadian Pacific Railways as a medical officer among construction crews. He returned to the East after some years and practised in Rexton near Newswick. Post-graduate work called him to New York and after a few years of general practice he came to this city to lay the foundation of a practise which eventually made him almost an institution here.

When he first came to Moncton, there was no hospital and he ministered to the sick with apt attention. Following the erection of Moncton's first hospital, on the marsh leading to Leger Corner, he continued to give his best services and he was an important factor in the founding of the present Moncton City Hospital. He has taken an active part in hospital work, being senior surgeon at City Hospital and also an instructor at the training school for nurses. He was also regional medical officer for the Canadian National Railways and did much valuable work for the Provident Fund Board.

Dr. Ferguson was a noted surgeon but one who avoided all honors. He disliked all public show and hid his greatness under a retiring disposition. Nevertheless his reputation as a skilled surgeon spread to many parts of Canada and the United States. Leaders in surgery in Montreal, one of the world's centres of surgical skill, respected his views and opinions. He became a fellow of the American College of Surgeons in 1920 but refused all other honors.

Surviving are his wife, formerly Miss Janet McEachern, Souris, P. E. I., a former superintendent of Moncton City Hospital; three sisters, the Misses Annie and Agnes Ferguson, Richibucto, and Ella, Brookfield, N.S.; his brother, Frederick, Richibucto; one half-brother, John Ferguson, Newcastle and one half-sister, Miss Elsie Ferguson, Richibucto.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon from the residence, following which the body will be taken to Montreal, where it will be cremated.
