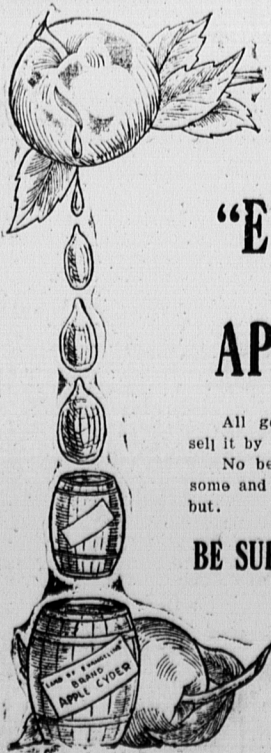

**POLICE COURT**—Yesterday's bill of fare at the Police Court comprised a somewhat varied programme. A young man for breach of the Motor Vehicle Act—in other words, for speeding—was fined \$5 or ten days; another for breach of the Traffic Regulations—in this case having his engine going at a time when it should have been stopped, was also fined \$5 or ten days. A man for disorderly driving with his horse, and carriage, was similarly fined. A drunk and disorderly was fined \$10 or thirty days, and a plain drunk, \$20 or 30 days.

**THE PROVINCIAL BANK OF CANADA**—We notice that The Provincial Bank of Canada is increasing its paid-up Capital by a million dollars of new stock. This stock is offered to the public at \$120.00 per share, and all applications for stock must be received at the Head Office of the Bank in Montreal on or before the 2nd day of June next, to be considered. This Bank is growing very fast, and is extending its business in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Its deposits by the public now reach the sum of \$27,000,000, being an increase of \$7,000,000 during the present year. Its assets have also had a similar increase and now reach a total of \$37,000,000. In the bank reports to the Federal Government on the 31st of March last, this Bank's liquid assets were over 78 per cent of its total liabilities to the public. This is an exceptionally strong financial position, showing capable management, and was very favorably commented on by the financial Newspapers of Montreal. The Reserve fund is 50 per cent of the present paid-up capital and the earnings for the year together with the premium on the new stock will enable the directors to put such a large sum to credit of the Reserve fund this year, that it will equal almost 50 per cent on the total paid-up Capital of \$3,000,000. The directors of this bank have decided to increase its dividends from 8 per cent to 9 per cent from the 1st of July next which will yield 7 1/2 per cent on the investment. Applications for this new stock will be received at any of the branches of the Bank.

### HOW COOKING MAY AFFECT THE FLAVOR OF VEGETABLES

It may help the housekeeper if we formulate a series of maxims, a sort of Poor Richard's Almanac of Vegetable Cookery.

**Serve Summer Vegetables** Soon after gathering.

**Keep Winter Vegetables**—in dry cold place.

**Wash All Vegetables Well**—with small brush kept for the purpose.

**Sweet Juiced Vegetables**—Such as celery, carrots or beets, should be cooked in small quantity of water.

**Strong Juiced Vegetables**—such as cabbage, onions and turnips may be cooked in larger quantity of water.

**Add Salt to Water**—When vegetables are about half done. The

proportion is one-half to one teaspoon of salt to each quart of water. Color Will Be Kept—by cooking uncovered.

**Wilted Vegetables**—may be freshened by crisping in cold water. Take a Cooking Time-table to the Kitchen—but remember it is only a general guide, as the time varies according to age of vegetables.

**Cook Fresh Vegetables Quickly**—That is, in rapidly boiling water. Simmer Dried Vegetables Slowly—To soften fibre and thoroughly cook starch.

**Season all Vegetables Delicately**—just before serving.

**Serve all Vegetables Attractively**—to "feed the eye."

### FOOTWEAR

Another physician says he hates to look out of his office window and see all the ill-shod feet carrying their owners to ill-health or invalidism before the middle years are passed. Here again women are the worst sufferers. Let us make it the fashion to wear an easy-fitting light-weight shoe, board-soled, low-heeled as soft as a stocking, the kind of shoe you hardly know you have on the kind that gives the sensation of winged feet and walking on air.

All the blood in the body has to circulate through these flimsy excitements of ours; we should not allow it to carry fatigue poisons from them to the rest of the system. Let us keep our feet at all times free and uncramped, let us keep them dry and warm and well ventilated. If you care for your feet as conscientiously as you do for your hands, if you refresh them with daily changes of stockings and more than one daily change of shoes, you will experience a generous return in giving ease, and lightness and joy to the whole body.

Much taffeta is employed for spring frocks, as well as much foulard. The taffeta frequently shows a glazed surface—taffeta crepe—and the foulard is patterned often very generously with color, although many of the smartest designs are in black and white. Mohair will be used for summer cloaks—a coat of mohair or serge is smart over a foulard frock—and foulard frocks will be trimmed with serge.

## FASHIONS FOR CANADIANS

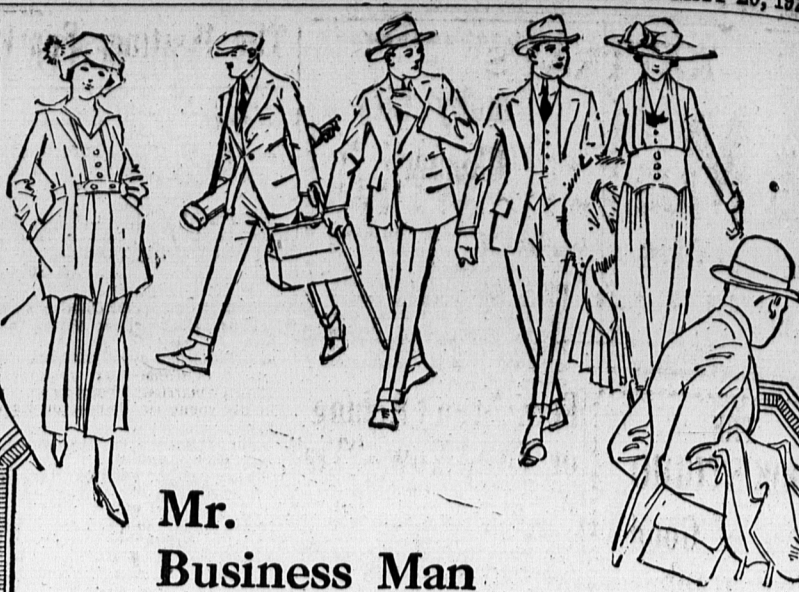
Interesting and novel vest effects are among the season's neckwear specialties, and with the arrival of approach of warm weather the demand for accessories of this kind increases. Many of the vests, gumpes, etc., shown may be worn without a separate blouse or suit accompaniments, thus making the outfit cooler and lighter in weight than when a blouse is worn with the suit, coat or jacket.

Today's sketch offers a suggestion for two smart effects to be worn with short jacket or coat suits. For the upper one Roman striped ribbon is used. It consists merely of collar, revers, and wide sash tied gracefully at one side. The lower of the two sketches shows a pretty little separate vest that fits smoothly to the waist-line, where it is laid in a soft fulness, the lower part being extended so that it fastens in the back, thus holding it securely in place. When a suit coat is slipped on over this little vest the vest has the appearance of one of the hip-length slip-over blouses. This may be made of a soft silk, if preferred, but it would be dainty and smart for warm weather wear made of organdy and finished with little self-fabric ruffles.

Vestings may be purchased by the yard, either of plain or shirred net or of finely tucked organdy, so that the making of one of these little accessories is a comparatively simple matter. Ecru batiste is used effectively in the development of many vests and gumpes as well as separate collar and cuff sets. These batiste affairs may be embroidered in eyelet design or finished with insets of Venise lace.

In the line-up of dress accessories veils can never be overlooked, and for the present and coming season the close fitting shaped veils and those that are loosely draped share honors. The vogue for large hats for mid-summer wear will almost inevitably swing the latter demand to the draped effects. Chenille dotted weaves, fancy

meshes and novel scroll designs are all in demand, it is said. As to gloves, the big demand is for long ones, and silk gloves in white as well as several shades of tan and gray are approved by Dame Fashion.

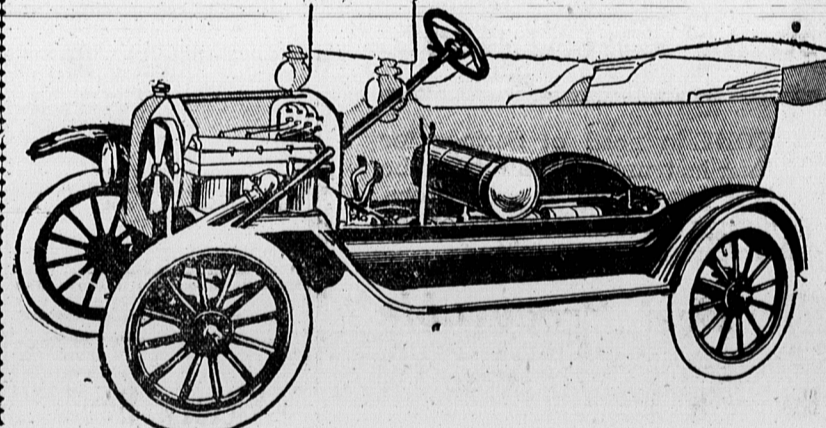
