FRANCE TO MAKE A DEMONSTRATION

Against Morocco on the Whole Frontier Unless the French Algerian Citizen now Under Arrest is Released—One more Final Demand and then Embassy Will Withdraw

PARIS, Aug. 24.—(Special)—A special meeting of the Cabinet today decided that a military demonstration will be made against Morocco unless the Sultan promptly yields to the French demands for the release of the French Algerian citizen named Bouzain who was unjustly arrested at Gharb on the Algerian frontier.

Instructions were sent to the French minister at Fez to make a final and an imperative demand on the Sultan. If this is not complied with the whole embassy will at once leave Morocco and the military movement will at once be made along the entire frontier.

1,200 NEW SHIPS IN MERCHANT SERVICE.

Growth of the British Merchant Service Since 1902 Has Gone on at Remarkably Rapid Rate.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Since 1902 no fewer than 1,271 vessels, representing a tonnage of 589,356, have been added to the British mercantile marine, which continues to grow at a remarkably rapid rate.

According to the annual statement of the navigation and shipping of the United Kingdom for 1904, which was issued on Saturday, the total number of vessels on the registers in the United Kingdom and British possessions, with their tonnage, during the past three years, was as follows:

A curious feature of the returns is the increase they show in sailing vessels, their numbers having grown 22,036 in 1902 to 22,331 last year.

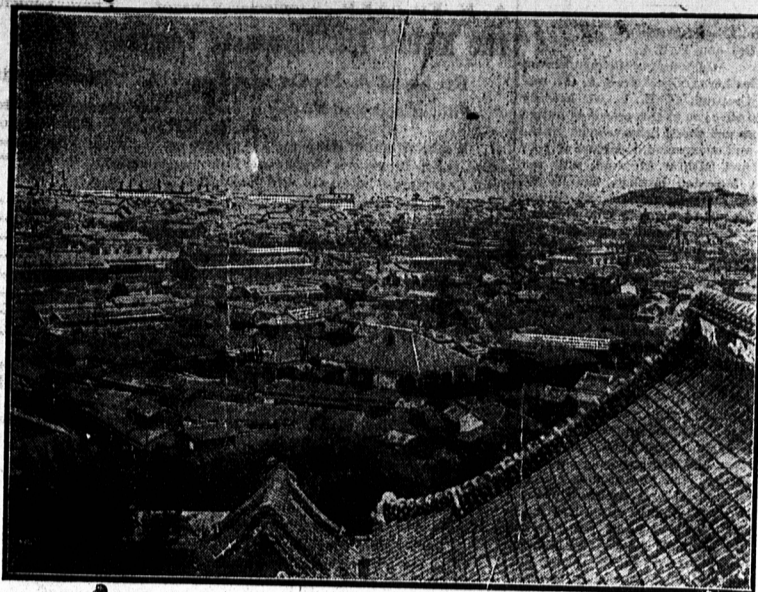
Liverpool easily leads the way among the ports having the largest tonnage of vessels on the register, the respective positions being as follows:

Some interesting figures are given showing the British vessels actually employed during 1904 in the home and foreign trades, and the number and class of persons employed in them. The comparison between 1902 and 1904 is as follows:

The number of vessels built in the United Kingdom last year, excluding those for the navy and for foreigners was 1,043, with a tonnage of 735,384. This is a decrease of 120 in number but an increase of 100,315 in tonnage, compared with the previous year.

EMPEROR WILLIAM MAY BE HINDRANCE

To the Peace Prospects at the Conference at Portsmouth—May be Urging Russia Not to Relinquish Further while He Endorses Efforts of President Roosevelt

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 24.—(Special)—There is now a general belief that Emperor William is at the bottom of much of the peace trouble by urging the Czar not to yield to any further demands of the Japanese while at the same time William pretends to be supporting President Roosevelt's efforts to secure peace.

One reason why Russia flatly refused Japan's compromise was because the amount of the purchase of Sakhalin was mentioned.

Roosevelt had suggested to Japan that this be left to arbitration but Komura inserted a specific amount.

Russia it is believed is willing to treat for the purchase of the island on a business basis.

The Japanese feeling tonight is that demands may be slightly modified but at the same time the representatives think it better to fight it out now when the armies are in the field rather than have to renew the war again in a few years.

Messages from St. Petersburg today all flatly refuse to accept compromise offered yesterday by Japan.

Roosevelt is communicating directly with Emperor Nicholas tonight and there remains some faint hope for Saturday's meeting.

WARSAW UNDER MARTIAL LAW

The Bridge on the Vistula has been Blown up and Communication is now Interrupted

WARSAW, Aug. 24.—(Special)—The whole Government of Warsaw has been placed under martial law.

The Bridge on the Vistula Railway near Radom has been blown up and communication is now interrupted.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 22.—The thirteenth biennial session of the Supreme Lodge of colored Knights of Pythias of North and South America, Australia, the Hawaiian Islands and the West Indies convened here yesterday. The Supreme Lodge, the division of the Uniform Rank and the Supreme Court of Calantha, a women's auxiliary, will be in session simultaneously from Aug. 21 to 26, inclusive. Yesterday was largely devoted to executive sessions. On Friday supreme officers will be elected, and the vote for holding the next biennial convention will be taken.

While Her Mother Was Away She Set Fire to Some Paper in Back Yard—Will Likely Die.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 24.—(Special)—Jennie Watson, the five year old daughter of Frederick Watson, today while her mother was away set fire to some paper in the backyard and in an instant the flames leaped to her light clothing.

Some other children saw the accident and hurried to help the little girl but before the fire was extinguished she was terribly burned and will probably die.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—(Special)—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy has protested against the route located by the Grand Trunk from Portage to Touchstone Hills.

The C. P. R. claims that for 250 miles the new road will be within ten miles of the C. P. R., whereas under the government promise the two roads should never be less than 35 miles apart.

BREACH OF TRUST OPENLY CHARGED

Against the Supreme Council of the Royal Arcanum—Lively time at a Secret Session Held

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—The World says: At a 12 hour secret session attended by representatives of seven-eighths of the Royal Arcanum membership of the United States and Canada, held yesterday in the Manhattan Hotel, resolutions were adopted demanding that the supreme council of the order discuss next week the action of raising the rates made at Atlantic last week.

If this is not done it was announced there would be wholesale secessions, and scores of lawsuits by members that will disband the order. Open charges of breach of trust were made against the supreme council. The session was attended by prominent Arcanumites from the State of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Michigan, embracing a membership of 250,000 out of the total of 310,000 in the entire order.

General H. C. Cochrane, of Chester Pa. one of the leaders of the order, says of the supreme council's action:

"It should be investigated as carefully as the affairs of the Equitable Life Assurance Society. If anything is wrong it must be known and steps taken to right the evil."

Chas. Day, grand secretary of the order in Massachusetts, said that if the supreme council did not revoke its action the matter would be placed before the supreme court on August 31. "There will be at least 150,000 law suits against the order filed on that day," he said. "In that event the Royal Arcanum would be practically killed, as it would pass into the hands of a receiver."

It was agreed that if the supreme council was to abandon the objectionable rates the grand councils in each state shall meet and prepare a uniform procedure to be acted upon at a special meeting of representatives. A resolution was also passed to formulate a plan for a permanent organization to look after the interests of all subordinate councils as against "future tyranny of the supreme council."

IMPROVEMENTS BY TELEPHONE CO.

Are Now in Progress—Work Expected to be Completed This Fall—Extensive Changes are Being Made

The Telephone Company who during the past two summers have been engaged in completely re-arranging and re-building their entire overhead wire plant in Charlottetown are now busy on the final work connected with the change.

During the past two weeks over seventy miles of wires in cables have been put in service and several thousand connections changed in the Central office. A large part of the work will be completed within a few days and sufficient circuits provided for present requirements.

Subscribers are being provided with metallic circuits as rapidly as possible and this together with the other work in hand will be entirely completed this fall.

Extensive additions are also being made to the central office plant.

The unsightly mass of wires over the Provincial Building which has been an eyesore for years, as well as many old wires on Great George and Queen Street have been removed. These changes are naturally causing some little trouble for a few days until everything is finally adjusted. All the telephone poles are also receiving a coat of paint.
