The death of John Thomas Hughes occurred at his late residence at Bedford, Prince Edward Island on November 2nd, in his 77th year.

A large circle of relatives and friends are sadly missing the dynamic personality of Emma Charlotte Chipman Campbell who passed away Oct. 25, 1947, after a lengthy illness, at her home, 2-1325 West 15th Ave., Vancouver, B. C.

She was born in Covehead, P.E.I., in 1866, the daughter of Rev. Jas. Allan and Mrs. Allan. The cherished memory of these two has been perpetuated in the story of "Anne of Green Gables." Mrs. Campbell's family became divided. She was predeceased by 2 baby sisters, her father in 1891, her mother, Dec. 5, 1917, her brother, Col. John R. Allan of Covehead in 1935 and Dr. Arold of Cardigan, Dec. 5, 1946 all of whom are buried on the island, except her mother, who is buried in the West, too. The rest of her family live in the West, namely, brother, J. B. and sisters, Mrs. Helen McLeod and Mabel, Mrs. W. P. Grant.

Mrs. Campbell was educated in Halifax Ladies College. On graduation she taught music and then married lawyer J.H. Goode. Their children are Jean, Mrs. R. McMillan of Winnipeg and Jimmie Goode of Toronto, known as blackface comedian in the "Dumbells," a show of World War I fame.

About 1897, they came west and entered the turbulent, pioneer mining days of Rossland. In Jan. 1902, Mr. Goode died. Late the following year she married a friend of the family, Edmund F. Campbell and the family settled in Vancouver. Mrs. Allan made her home with her daughter Emma.

She was a very active worker in the church. Her great popularity was attributed to her dry wit, vivaciousness, hospitality and "a heart of gold". Her irreparable loss is keenly felt in the home by her grieving husband and daughter, Mrs. Allan like her mother, "leaves behind the fragrance of a Christian life."

She leaves to mourn her loving husband Edmund F. Campbell, one son James A. Goode, Toronto, two daughters, Mrs. R. McMillan, Winnipeg and Nonie at home.

JOHN J. CAMPBELL

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital on October 31st, of John J. Campbell of Red Point, Kings County. The deceased was born on the parental homestead on May 8, 1874, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus Campbell, and during his entire life carried on the duties of an exemplary citizen.

In 1903, he married Sarah MacDonald of Red Point, and to them eight children were born, seven of whom are living — one son died in infancy. There are left to mourn his wife, Mrs. John J. Campbell, sons, Hugh, Donald and Augustine; daughters, Martina, Mrs. Jerome Sutherland, Mrs. Michael MacInnis, Eleanor, Mrs. John H. Parmelee, Sumerville, Mass., and Estelle, in life a strong man, physically, mentally and morally, he took an active interest in the promotion of everything that benefited his home, the community in which he lived, and in the civil and religious duties that characterize the good citizen; a man of more than average intelligence and understanding, he took a keen interest in the political issues of his time and in the administration of government of Prince Edward Island and Canada. He was for many years a first executive in his association with agricultural institute and different cooperative organizations, also, for some years, inspector of Public Roads, where he established a wide contact and made many friends.

In his home — in relation to his family he was a kind husband and an affectionate father and it is in this circle where he will be particularly missed.

A devout member of St. Mary's Parish, Souris, up to the time of his first illness when he suffered a stroke in 1938, he was always a constant and regular attendant at Holy Mass. During the years that followed, he never really regained his former health, but remained fairly active until two weeks before his death it became necessary for him to go to Souris Hospital, and was subsequently removed to the Charlottetown Hospital, where everything possible was done to alleviate his failing strength and sickness; several of his family were with him to help him with every comfort possible, and were consoled by the fact that he remained conscious to his dying moments, when with his soul fortified by the Holy Sacraments of the Church, he quietly expired on October 31st, at 5:30 A.M.

The funeral was held on Sunday, November 2nd, to St. Mary's Church, Souris, and was one of the largest in the history of the parish. The funeral service was conducted by the pastor, Msgr. J.A. Murphy, who also performed service at the grave. The pallbearers were: Emanuel Sutherland, Jerome Chapman, Nelson Stewart, Theodore Robertson, Peter A. MacLellan and Louis MacInnis. Eternal rest grand unto him O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May he rest in peace. Amen.

What You Should Know about TRAVEL RATIONING

Why?

Canada's supply of U.S. dollars will no longer stretch far enough to permit all the purchases of goods and services or all the travel in the United States that has taken place in the past. It is, therefore, necessary to reduce our expenditures of U.S. dollars in many different ways. As one of these steps, the Government has decided that the use of U.S. dollars for pleasure travel spending must be reduced. To ensure this reduction in a way that is fair to all, an annual "travel ration" has been established. As in the past—a Form H permit is required by anyone taking out of Canada more than \$10 U.S. or more than a total of \$25 in Canadian and foreign currencies.

Pleasure Travel

Regulations now provide that the maximum amount of U.S. dollars which any Canadian resident may obtain for pleasure travel purposes is \$50 per year. In the case of children of eleven years and under, the amount is \$100. There is no restriction on the number of trips as long as this annual allotment is not exceeded. Any U.S. dollars obtained for one trip and not used on that trip must be brought back to Canada and exchanged for Canadian dollars at a bank immediately on return. No credit for these funds can be allowed against the annual ration for subsequent trips.

Business Travel

Applications for U.S. dollars for business travel must include a certification by the employer that the travel is required in his business interest. Reasonable amounts of U.S. dollars may be obtained for this purpose.

Travel for Health or Education

Applications for U.S. dollars for travel for health or educational reasons are to be made on special forms available at chartered banks. These applications will be forwarded by banks to the Foreign Exchange Control Board for consideration. Applications for health travel must be accompanied by a medical report on forms which can also be obtained at chartered banks. The Department of National Health and Welfare will act as advisor to the Board in reviewing these medical reports.

Border Travel

A Canadian resident wishing to make visits on which he will not be taking out of Canada more than a total of \$25 of which not more than \$10 is in U.S. dollars, may purchase from his bank for this purpose up to a total of \$10 in any calendar month. This is in addition to the annual travel ration.

Personal Purchases of U.S. Goods

A Canadian tourist should remember that the new restrictions applying to imports from the United States govern his personal purchases there. He may not bring back any merchandise which has now been prohibited or which may now only be imported on a quota basis. The list of goods covered by the new import restrictions is an extensive one. Tourists contemplating any particular purchase in the United States would be wise, before leaving the country, to ask Canadian Customs Officials if this purchase will be admitted.

Travel Requiring Sterling Funds

Applications for sterling funds for travel in sterling area countries are normally approved for any reasonable amounts.
