We are in the big confederation and no doubt in to stay, although that measure has proved in many ways disappointing. We reluctantly gave up to the federal government the full control of our railways, our customs and excise revenues, our tariff, or postal service and so on.

We feel that the little union would not remove or provide a remedy for any of the ills that have come to us under the big union. The more especially are we convinced of this because in the proposed Acadian Parliament we could have but one in ten of the total membership.

THOUSAND MEN MAY BE LOCKED OUT

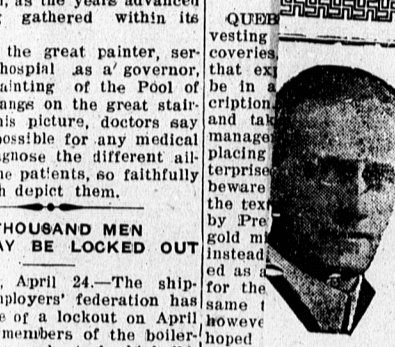
