MEXICAN BORDER RAIDS SERIOUS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The possibility that American troops might cross the Rio Grande to deal with the raiding border counties in Texas was talked of here today as a result of yesterday's border fight between United States soldiers and Mexicans near Progreso, Texas. One American soldier was killed and an officer wounded in the battle. At least four Mexicans, perhaps more, were shot down, it was reported.

An incident that added to the seriousness of the situation in the eyes of war department officials was the fact as reported by General Funston, that several hundred uniformed Mexicans on the southern border covered the retreating raiders. One report said that American army officers described some of the raiders as Carranza soldiers.

As viewed here the incident is regarded as one of the most serious of the numerous disturbances along the border. Secretary of War Harrison was out of the city today, but a detailed report of the affair from General Funston has been telegraphed to him. General Funston, however, has full authority to take whatever measures that are necessary to deal with any situation that may arise.

CEASELESS STREAM OF GERMAN WOUNDED

ROTTERDAM, Sept. 28.—Along the whole front in Flanders and beyond, heavy fighting is in progress. The roar of cannon is heard ceaselessly at places well inside the Zeeland frontier and an endless procession of German wounded are pouring into the towns and villages behind the enemy's lines in Belgium. In Bruges, Roulers, and scores of smaller places every regular hospital is full and schools and convents are being transformed into lazarettos.

Whatever may be the final issue of events now in hand it can at least be said already that the Germans are hard pressed. Even the news that has leaked out from their side, indicates this, whilst on various points on the Belgian Dutch frontier reports are circulating with striking persistence that the French and British have achieved great successes, that they are steadily pushing forward and that there is evidence in the nature of the movement behind the enemy's lines pointing of a retreat though not of a general character.

The German losses from a prolonged and concentrated fire from the Allies' artillery were already mounting to an enormous figure and those in the infantry fighting which has followed in the last forty eight hours are described as terrible. Every available man in Belgium is being flung into the defense. Troops newly arrived are being rushed to the firing line before they have had an hour's rest, whilst villages and even frontier posts are being denuded of guards, often either landstrummers, in a so far vain endeavor to meet the Allies' great onslaughts. The bombardment of Zeeland and other points on the Belgian coast have surpassed in intensity and duration all previous bombardments of this coast. The thundering of guns have caused houses to fall and many even in Zealand to shake on their foundations.

BULGARS FROM CANADA MAY BE FOES

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—The government is in a quandary over the Bulgarians in Canada who have been recalled to the colors. A number of firms who employ a large number of Bulgarians have notified the Justice Department that their employees are leaving to join the Bulgarian army.

However, Bulgaria has not yet declared war upon the allies, and has not yet even declared its intention to join the central powers. Until it does Canada cannot take action to prevent Bulgarians from leaving the country, even if it is surmised that they will be soon fighting against the allies and Canada.

The census of 1911 showed that there were only 1,669 Bulgarians in Canada. However, during the past few years there has been a heavy immigration into Canada from Bulgaria.

Immigration figures show that over 25,000 Bulgarians have entered since the last census was taken, and most of these men are of military age.

EIGHT MEN SHOT IN STREET FIGHT

AKRON, Ohio, Sept. 26.—Eight men were shot, one seriously, in a street fight early today. Two men have been arrested, John Justice, aged 45, is the most injured. He has a bullet in his head and has lost one eye. He is in a hospital. Those under arrest are Paul Hawkins, aged 19, a rubber worker, who is charged with shooting with intent to kill, and Harry Douglas, held for carrying concealed weapons. Hawkins was captured by a squad of police who fought their way into the basement of a house near the scene of the fighting where Hawkins had barricaded himself with a shot gun.

The police say the fight started over an argument in the street.

THE DISPLACED GERMAN ADMIRALS.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—Admiral Von Holtzendorff, former commander of the German high seas fleet, now is chief of the naval general staff, succeeding Vice-Admiral Bechmann, Rear Admiral Behneke, vice-chief of naval general staff, also is out. It is understood his successor will be Admiral Von Koch, inspector of marine construction at the naval academy, although this appointment is unconfirmed.

The changes, which were made sometime ago, took place in connection with the modification in the submarine policy signalled by Ambassador von Bernstorff's declarations at Washington.

The displaced admirals, it is understood, were opposed to the modifications made effective at that time.

STRENGTH OF BALKAN STATES NOW ON THE BRINK OF WAR

Bulgaria—Active forces on peace footing, 120,000; first line reserves, 300,000; all other reserves, 300,000; total 720,000. Roumania—Active forces on peace footing, 100,000; first line reserves, 150,000; all other reserves, 320,000. Total, 600,000. Greece—Active forces on peace footing, 70,000; all reserves estimated, 320,000. Total 400,000. Assuming that Greece and Roumania will enter the war on the side of the allies if Bulgaria joins the Austro-Germans, the allied forces on paper would be reinforced by nearly one million troops and the Austro-Germans by 720,000. Greece's forces are widely scattered and Greece probably would be slow in mobilization.

CROWN PRINCE HAS BROKEN DOWN

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The German Crown Prince will soon be relieved of his command on the western front, if the change has not already been made, according to a German officer just brought prisoner to England.

The officer says that the real reason for the Crown Prince's mental condition, recently pointed out, was due to the fear that he would be superseded because of his failure against the Allies.

The Crown Prince, this officer said, repeatedly ordered attacks known to be foolhardy by other experienced officers, but would not listen to advice. On two occasions prominent members of his staff pleaded with him not to sacrifice men in view of certain reverses but the Crown Prince paid no heed.

"It is not surprising," the officer said, "that the Crown Prince has broken down, as he was constantly on duty and refused to take a proper rest. He was blindly obsessed with the desire to smash the enemy's lines, with the result that a serious nervous condition set in."

The German prophesied that the Crown Prince's place would be taken by Von Mackensen, who would leave the eastern forces so entrenched for the winter that the Russians would be unable to force them back or break through.

ITALIAN MINISTER OF MARINE RESIGNS FROM CABINET.

ROME, via Paris, Sept. 28.—The Cabinet has accepted the resignation of Vice Admiral Leone Viale, the Minister of Marine. Premier Salandra assumes the portfolio provisionally. The retirement is attributed to ill health.

ROUMANIAN TROOPS WILL REMAIN ON FRONTIERS

(Special to the Guardian)

BUCHAREST, Sept. 27.—The Roumanian Cabinet at a meeting today in which the mobilization of Bulgaria and Greece was discussed, decided that Roumania should continue the course she has been following. These new developments it was determined, are not of a nature to cause Roumania to modify in any way the line of conduct she has pursued to the present. Consequently, Roumania troops will remain concentrated along the national frontiers. The Cabinet did not consider the question of establishing martial law.
