GINGER COOKIES

(Nice for the school lunch box)

3 to 4 cups flour  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1 scant teaspoon cinnamon  
 1 tablespoon ginger  
 Speck nutmeg  
 1/2 cup shortening  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 egg  
 1 cup molasses  
 1 tablespoon vinegar  
 2 scant teaspoons soda  
 1/2 cup boiling water

Sift three cups of flour with the seasonings and spices. Cream together the sugar and shortening and add the egg. Beat well, and add molasses and vinegar; then the sifted dry ingredients. Dissolve the soda in the boiling water and add last of all. If necessary, add more flour to make a soft dough. Stand in a cool place overnight. Next day, flour the hands, break off small bits of dough, roll into balls, place in a buttered baking pan and pat into flat cakes (not too thin). Sprinkle with sugar. Bake in a moderate oven for eight or ten minutes.

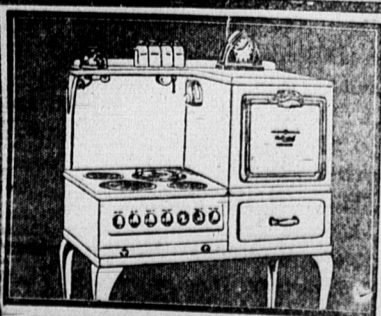

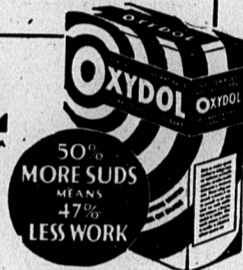
