Many times it required a sacrifice to keep children at school and was gratifying to know the sacrifice was appreciated. It was becoming a well known fact today, the speaker said, that the side of life was only half an education—indeed was not an education at all. Education and religion could not be separated without disaster. It had been tried. Only by cultivating the moral side of life would man amount to something worthwhile.

To the graduates Dr. McMahon said, "You have received the education which is needed for a complete education. 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MISS BEERS' REPORT  
"Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen, it is my privilege and pleasure to present my eleventh annual report of the daily activities of our organization, that give you a glimpse of the work of our children of P. E. Island. "For our organization, concerned with conditions in which children are brought up, these are truly difficult and trying years. Yet the work goes on, keeping the daily life of the child committed to our care of a high level, giving them physical, spiritual and moral training which we hope to enable them to stand firm under the pressure of life in the years that lie before them.

"From committee reports you will note our daily average was 66, with highest daily care standing at 100. The work goes on, prety much the same day, meeting the problems as they arise, endeavouring to teach erring parents their duty toward their children and their home. Every child's birthright is the security of their parents' love and protection, and too many of our children are being checked out of life's best. It seems that on this Island home life would be secure, but we are still grappling with the problem and aside from protecting the children from various reasons, we must be cared for—the solution is not in sight.

"In the past year three children after some considerable time under care, were re-established with their parents, the homes being under supervision. Our greatest work is re-building the broken-down home. The adoption committee find it work more difficult each year, there must be many homes in this province that would be brightened by the laughter of a little child. In view of such conditions we must continue to make our institution as home-like as possible. Routine must of necessity be, but ours is more elastic and has no serious problems of discipline. "Unmarried mothers have as in past years been helped to patch up their broken homes and re-establish themselves in the community. We are still trying to cope with the grave problem of the mentally retarded child. Feeble-minded people are still bringing into the world a disproportionately large number of children. It is all very well to dump them in our orphanages—all very fine to thus avoid the problem because it is difficult to deal with—but sooner or later we will have to deal with it. Handling the cases that demand attention is not the solution. We need more with the source of supply and reduce the number of sad and distressing cases that tax the resources of our social agencies.

"General health of the children was good throughout the year. Dr. Tidmarsh's report tabulates the emergency. This coming summer we will have a large group for tetoid, vaccinations and T. & A. S. "The past summer was particularly difficult for our children because of hot dry weather. Weeks of hot dry weather kept us alert to keep the toddlers comfortable. We were fortunate by daily watchful care encounter no snags; they all gained weight, acquired a good coat of hair, and stored up energy for the long winter. The public health department is deeply grateful for Dr. Tidmarsh's continued supervision. As usual Mrs. Ayers looked after our general health, always so generous in child needs care. To the surgical and nursing staff of the P. E. I. Hospital for their great sympathy and loving care to any of our children admitted there, our grateful "thank you" is hereby publicly extended.

"We continued to add to the general appearance of the grounds, grading, sub-grading, planting trees etc. The dry summer played havoc with our flowers but on the whole things looked pretty good. The garden looked exceptionally well while a later one suffered from drought. We gave an abundance of fresh vegetables and winter supply. The value of the garden to the welfare and health of children cannot be reckoned in dollars and cents. "The Gryo Club sponsored two girls to the C. G. T. camp, and Ladies' Aid of Mt. Herbert United Church one. They enjoyed every minute and made fine friends. They derived much benefit from camp life. The older group had a day at the Exhibition and a day at the picnic. We celebrate our festive days, and Christmas is especially gay. The orphan's friend, J. D. O'Connell, still keeps the children in mind at this time instead of annual summer picnics. The Prises Edward Isaac Preceptory and Gyrone Club send their group over Christmas morning with everything to supply all the little boys and girls wishes of the boys and girls. This annual visit tells us how they have the interest of the needy child at heart and I have no doubt they go back to their homes with an added Christmas joy. Friends all over the Island keep the children in mind at this happy season and various organized groups from East Point to West Cape. All make special contributions to the Gryo Club, from time to time throughout the year. We are then enabled to do things for our group that would otherwise be impossible. "Queen Mary's Needle Guild still continue their wonderful work year by year; a large number of the women's institutes are orphanage-minded. In the autumn a quite annual patching party is quite an event and our quilts are put in perspective. Our quilts are put in perspective in from time to time and our last autumn 21 quilts were dressed up in new covers; and we are grateful to the friends who gather each year and to all who keep our needs in mind. "Our school goes along the same as any public school. Here again Prince Edward Island's necessary supplies all our needs. We had enrolled with a beginners' class of nine at the start of the school year. Inspector McPhail visited as usual; his report tells his findings in our Grades I-VII. Our home is non-secularian. 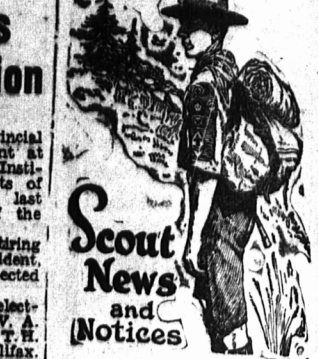
