He referred to the selfishness in sport, in gambling, drinking, smoking, &c., and claimed that the only true pleasure was that which not only was without selfishness but which gave pleasure to others. A meeting will be held tonight at 7.45 and tomorrow night at the same hour.

Samuel Howard, who in July will assume the pastorate of the Sackville Methodist Church, was born in Cornwall, Prince Edward Island. He was graduated from Mount Allison University with the degree of B. A. in 1884 and was given B. D. from the same institution he was ordained in Charlottetown in June 1885. During his probation he served one year at Baie Du Vin another as assistant pastor in Fredericton. Since ordination he has served on the following circuits: Hampton, Richmond, Florenceville, Sackville, Baie Verte, Portland and Exmouth streets, St. John. He is now on his second year in St. Stephen. Mr. Howard was elected president of the N. B. and P. E. I. conference in 1908 and has always stood high among his brethren. On December 24th 1885 he was married to Miss Annie J. Robertson, M. L. A. (Mount Allison 1879) and has two sons and two daughters. The sons are R. H., news editor of the Sydney Record and G. B., in the Bank of Montreal, Que. The daughters are Jean Robertson and Mary Allison, both born in Sackville.
