 Mrs. Rogers and daughter Martha of Summerside spent the week end in Moncton, the guests of Mrs. Geo. Steel.
 ...R. H. Stens, Charlottetown, visited Montague this week and took home with him one of these precious black beauties, for which he paid a long price. He purchased Mr. Reynolds from Smith & Co. B.
 ...The Summerside papers report that ex-sheriff Wright of Summerside met with a bad accident on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Wright was driving to his home from his farm at Bearlton when his horse, a spirited animal, turned a corner rather sharply overturning the carriage and falling himself with it. In the fall Mr. Wright was thrown violently to the ground and rendered unconscious. There was no one about at the time and it was not until about half an hour later that Mr. Wright's son accidentally arrived on the scene. He found his father just regaining consciousness, and took him back to the farm where medical aid was called in. Mr. Wright was seriously injured about the head and body as a result of the accident, but is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.

 On enquiry of bankmen in Charlottetown last night it was learned that there is nothing known definitely here about the purchase of the Bank of New Brunswick by the Bank of Nova Scotia.
 F. C. Reading, of North Sydney, leaves by the Northumberland this morning taking with him one pair of prize winning horses, weighing about three thousand pounds, which cannot be duplicated in this province. He also takes one good driver.
 Rev. Thomas Stebbings and his daughter sailed from Bristol for Quebec on the Royal George on the 2nd inst. after spending tea weeks in the old country, mostly in the south of England. On his arrival Rev. Mr. Stebbings will take up his work in his new pastorate in Albert county. - St. John Exc. The Rev. Mr. Stebbings is well known here.
 ...The S. S. Swansea Trader arrived in Montague yesterday at 2.30 p. m. from Halifax with thirty-five puncheons of molasses and sundry other freight. She leaves again today for Halifax calling at Charlottetown with 1000 and 300 bags potatoes. The enterprising firm of Pool and Thompson deserve much credit in bringing here the largest steamer that ever sailed up the Montague River. B.
 ...The result of the splendid work done by the Government dredge on the Montague River for the past few weeks was seen and realized yesterday when the S. S. Swansea Trader the largest ever in Montague sailed up the river and turned between the wharves with the assistance of the Fred M. Funeral takes place at Georgetown on arrival of son Thomas from Toronto who is expected this morning. - Pat.
