BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING AT NEW GLASGOW

Dr. J. H. Ayers Elected President at Annual Auxiliary Meeting

The 99th annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada and Newfoundland was held in the Christian Church, New Glasgow, P. E. I., on Wednesday July 6th, and was largely attended.

The morning session which opened at 11 a. m. was devoted to work reports and appointing committees.

The afternoon session opened at 2.30 p. m. with the President Dr. J. H. Ayers occupying the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. G. Quigley of New Glasgow, assisted by Rev. A. C. Cooper of Charlottetown.

At this point in the meeting Rev. J. M. Murchison, District Secretary sang very delightfully "We have an anchor."

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Secretary of the Society read the minutes of the last annual meeting held at Caledonia, which were on motion adopted.

The President, Dr. J. H. Ayers, in his report spoke of the Dominion annual meeting of the Society which was held in Toronto at which the principal speaker was His Excellency Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General of Canada.

M. A. D. D., our Honorary President had been appointed as Honorary Governor of the parent Society. Heart Ailment Cause Of Death Jury Finds

Peter Craig, 66-year-old retired Canada National Railway employee whose lifeless body was found Wednesday evening on Kensington Road about a mile from Charlottetown, came to his death from a heart attack while driving his carriage, a jury decided last night after hearing evidence.

The afternoon session closed with benediction by Rev. R. H. Stavert.

The evening session opened at 8 p. m. with the President, Dr. Ayers presiding.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. W. Tilley of New Glasgow. Rev. John Murchison again favored the meeting with an encouraging solo "Thy Word I Hid in My Heart."

The Secretary then read the minutes of the afternoon session which were on motion approved.

The District Secretary addressed the meeting. He congratulated the people of New Glasgow on the magnificent appearance of their Church. The Bible, Mr. Murchison said, gives us a right perspective of the things God asks of us, and is the savior's balance amid the varying elements of life.

Five million copies of the Scriptures have been circulated by this Society since its inception. The Bible must be in our home lives, if our nation is to be preserved.

Rev. Canon R. H. A. Haslam, D. D. addressed the evening session, also messages from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor DeBlois and Dr. H. D. Raymond.

The District Secretary, Rev. J. M. Murchison, thanked the Society for kindness extended to him during his recent illness.
