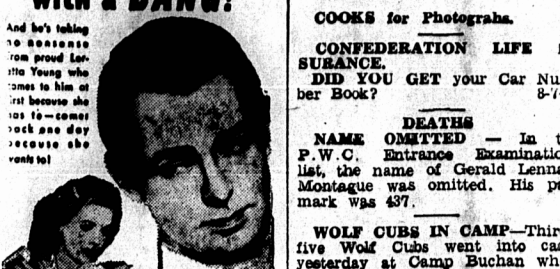

Dr. MacMillan also corroborated the sentiments of Miss Macmaster in her tribute to Mrs. W. J. MacIntyre, Past-National President, who was considered one of the greatest National Presidents in the history of the C. W. L.
