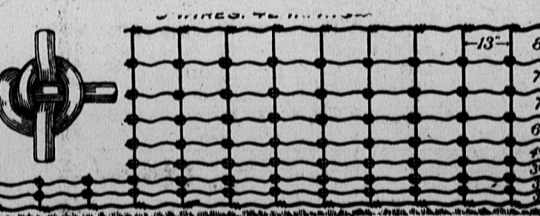

commodities now flows in one direction i.e. to the food companies. The farmer must do without this that much short, then what he has to sell, clear of those mentioned, are down to pre-war prices while what he has to buy is sold to him at a little below war prices, a small fraction only, therefore he is laboring under a great disadvantage. The merchant finds that the farmer and others are not buying as freely as formerly and so he is hit somewhat, and on account of dull business he does not advertise as extensively as he formerly did and others in that business, are hit also and business is affected in general. Next take the railways in Canada and the United States, they have lost fifty percent of their passenger traffic besides an enormous amount of freight traffic and have been obliged to increase their rates in an effort to make their roads pay, and yet they are going behind, most of them, and they are dismissing men, reducing their staff, in an effort to put the different lines on a paying basis. Consider for a minute, do you know of any auto manufacturers offering any stock for sale, or oil companies? Have you heard of any of them going out of business? Then ask yourself, do you know of any merchants wanting to sell out, or farms for sale or any newspapers or other industries closing out? I am not trying to knock any particular business but trying to show where the stream of money is running and running fast and we are encouraging it in that direction. We all over the Dominion of Canada are assisting in the game, "Rob Peter and pay Paul." It will be nice to be in Paul's shoes but I pity poor Peter in a few years hence. "Does it pay to buy in this Province? Money sent away never returns."

THE MARKETS

MONTHLY, April 9.—Owing to the approaching holidays in the United Kingdom, very few firm bids were received from foreign buyers for grain here today, but cables asking for offers of all lines for next Tuesday were numerous. Business on the whole was very quiet for both local and export account, but the feeling generally was firm in sympathy with the course of prices at other grain centres, while a firmer feeling prevailed in the local market. For spring wheat grades of flour today, there was no change in prices, the trade was very quiet. There was also a better feeling in the market for winter wheat grades, with an increased enquiry from buyers, which resulted in a small volume of business being done. There was no further developments in the mill-feed situation, business in all directions being rather quiet on account of the approaching holiday, but the tone was steady. The demand for rolled oats was limited. There was no change in any appearance in the egg market, prices ruling steady under a heavy demand from grocers and other dealers for supplies to meet the holiday requirements and an active business was done in a wholesale jobbing way as is usual at this period of the year. The receipts were 3,106 cases as against 2,803 for the same day last week and 4,725 for the corresponding day a year ago. The feature of the potato trade was the weaker feeling that developed in the market on account of the liberal offerings and prices scored a decline of 10 cents per bag. The butter market was easier and prices were reduced 1-2 cent per pound. Little business was transacted in cheese and prices were easier with fodder made No. 1 western white and colored quoted at 22 to 22 1-2 cents per pound and No. 2 grades at 21 to 21 1-2 cents per pound.

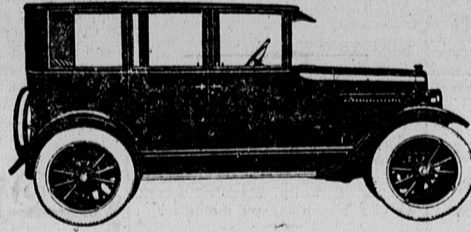
