—EARTHQUAKE IN INDIA

An earthquake that shook India not so long ago was remarkable for the curiously distorted effects it produced on standing objects. Similar effects have been noticed from other earthquakes, but seldom to so striking an extent. In an official report of the matter it is described how this earthquake twisted a lofty monument at Shakti. The monument was an obelisk of brick, coated with plaster, more than sixty feet tall and twelve feet of the top was broken off and thrown to the south and nine feet more was thrown to the east. Then a piece twenty feet in height was separated twenty-three feet above the ground and twisted in a direction opposite to the motion of the hands of a watch, but without falling.

RETENTION OF THE C. N. R. IS URGED

TORONTO, February 26.—Advocating the retention of the Canadian National Railways as a national concern, Brig. General C. E. Mitchell, in an address before the Lions Club here yesterday said: "We should not see it through and put it in a sound financial footing. It is a most important link in Empire trade."

General Mitchell said this country was a part of the most wonderful League of Nations the world had ever seen.

"As for Canada," he added "she stands in a strategic position for helping to achieve success in Empire trade."

EVEN MAKING MURDERERS

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—This afternoon, in continuation of the debate on the reply to the Speech from the Throne, G. G. Halverson, of Hamilton East, Labor member, formerly a supporter of the Dry Ministry, said that he had not only wished to go back to old conditions in connection with the liquor question, he claimed the O. T. A. was making "hypocrites, thieves and even murderers." He said he was informed of one hoodlegger in Hamilton who had the pictures of Sir William Hoare and Lord Raney in his parlor, pointing to them as "men who had done most for him, and he is said to have \$50,000 in the bank, whereas before the country went dry the best he could earn was twenty cents an hour." He wanted some amelioration of the act.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE AND TEMPERANCE ALLIED

MONTREAL, Feb. 26.—The need of militant leadership in the work of temperance forces throughout the Province was strongly emphasized this morning at the 42nd annual convention of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Alliance. One speaker declared that the "present situation was just as the alliance should wish. The first step in the battle for complete prohibition, said the speaker, was to get the traffic out of private hands and under Government control, and then abolish it altogether."

Mrs. Jane Grogan of Quebec, Provincial President of the W. C. T. U., declared in the course of her report that she firmly believed the Government was convinced that woman suffrage and temperance were allied.

Professor J. A. Nicholls of Boston, delivered a short, optimistic address, in which he urged the members of the Alliance to continue their efforts toward securing the complete abolition of liquor.

CALCUTTA, Feb. 27.—One hundred and sixty prisoners belonging to the non-co-operationist movement have been released from the Faridpur jail on the signing of certain promises.

TO REGAIN CONTROL

LONDON, Feb. 27.—The Daily News aviation correspondent referring to the unpublished report on the RGS disaster says: "It is now known that the Admiralty has been making strenuous efforts to have the Air Ministry abolished in order that it may regain control of airship the naval service. Hence, as Air Ministry's report points strongly toward Admiralty responsibility for the world's biggest ship disaster, the naval authorities are pulling every possible string in order to delay the publication of the report, if not to suppress it entirely."
