RAISED DOUGHNUTS.
(By Request Betsy).
Heat 1-2 cups milk, then place in a large bowl along with 2 tablespoons sugar, 3-4 teaspoon salt and 1-3 cup shortening. Mix and let cool until lukewarm, then add 1 well-beaten egg and 2 yeast cakes, dissolved in 1-4 cup lukewarm water. Mix well, then add enough flour to make a ball—a little stiffer than one makes for rolls. Let the dough rise to twice its bulk, keeping it warm while rising. Then place on floured board, mould it out, and twist it with the hands. Have hot fat ready and fry a few at a time, turning them but once. Drain on absorbent paper and serve with maple syrup, "dunking" them, if desired, in the syrup.

Interpreting The War

A scout flavor apparently got into the menu of the Axis love feast in Berlin, wholly aside from Yugoslavia's refusal to come to the party. Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuoka, the guest of honor, did not have a happy time of it apparently, nor could Italy's representatives at the feast but have been up and down its real nature or progress.

Nobody else was in the dark, even before the new Belgrade regime made its defiant answer to a Berlin demand for an explanation. Yugoslavian "neutrality" in the circumstances amounts to a formal challenge to Hitler and the next move in the deadly game is up to him.

Hitler's lexicon does not include either the word neutrality, in its accepted sense, or the word fall. Nations not actively with him are regarded against him. It is now clear that Matsuoka must have learned a lot about that during his Berlin stay.

Nazi censors have passed reports from Berlin saying virtually that the Japanese visitor was confronted with some sort of demand that Tokyo make good on the nebulous terms of her alignment with the Rome-Berlin Axis.

Something "specific" was suggested, the Berlin reports admit, very specific. An attack on Singapore, Britain's powerful far eastern naval base, already swarming with hard-fighting Australian defenders, was urged.

Falling such action, it was pointedly suggested to the Japanese visitor that a victorious Axis might have small interest in handing over British far eastern war spoils to an inactive partner.

If that was the tenor of the conversations in Berlin, Matsuoka probably was glad to leave. And just

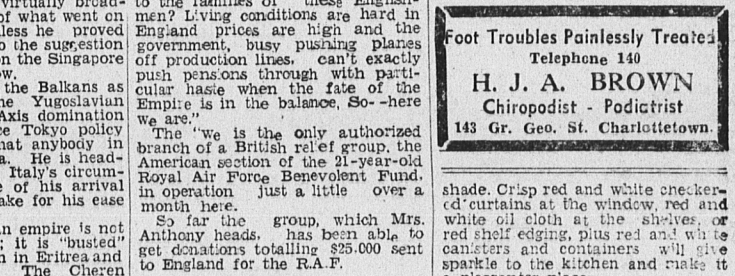
