OTTAWA MAN ARRESTED FOR MURDER.

BOSTON, Mass., July 19—Because he remonstrated with his landlord, for having, as he claimed, slapped Mrs. Lawson's face, James H. Lawson, a boarder, was shot and killed at the boarding house on Washington street, tonight. James F. Farrell, aged 46 years, the landlord, was arrested and charged with the murder.

Lawson, who is 28 years old, and hails from Nashville, Tenn., has been stopping at the house with his wife for some weeks. Yesterday, there was a quarrel, it is claimed, between Farrell and Mrs. Lawson, in which Farrell is said to have struck Mrs. Lawson. Tonight, Lawson had the matter out with Farrell, with the result that Farrell drew a revolver and fired two shots at Lawson, both of which took effect, killing him instantly.

Officer Healy, who went to the house to arrest Farrell, reported that the man attempted to draw his revolver when being placed under arrest and grappled with him. The man was finally lodged in police headquarters and booked on the charge of murder. Farrell came to Boston from Ottawa, Ontario.

FARMERS SAVED THOUSANDS BY TARIFF

WINNIPEG, July 19—Sir Wilfrid Laurier tonight discussed the tariff before an audience of four thousand people in the Brandon Skating Rink. Sir Wilfrid traced the history of the tariff movement from 1836. The Government appointed a Tariff Commission to inquire from every district, and revised the tariff affecting 481 articles on the dutiable list, on 150 of which the tariff was reduced and over 70 placed on the free list. In the latter classification, corn binder twine, fence wire, and cream separators were included, and he quoted the Minister of Customs' statement showing that this had resulted in a saving of \$360,000 to the farmers of the country.

"Now, sir, there is more than this. There is a provision that we put in the tariff for which I claim some credit for the Government. I refer to the British preference." This, said the Premier, operated today to the extent of 33 1/3 per cent.

HON. MR. FIELDING WILL REPRESENT CANADA.

OTTAWA, July 19—Hon. W. S. Fielding who is now in London will represent Canada at the bi-annual meeting of the International Navigation Association Congress to be held in Brussels on July 30. Hon. L. P. Brodeur, who is a member of the Congress has delegated Mr. Fielding to represent him at the meeting.

It is stated that the next meeting of the Congress will be held in Philadelphia in 1912, and an invitation will be extended to the members to inspect the principal inland and Maritime navigation channels in Canada.

Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine, will leave Ottawa on August 5th, for an inspection tour of the Great Lakes ports with a view to ascertaining harbor and navigation needs. The proposed deepening of the Welland Canal will lead to the use of larger vessels on the Lakes, and Hon. Mr. Brodeur will keep this in mind in planning any further harbor improvements at Port William. Port Arthur or other Lake ports. After his tour of inspection the Minister will go to Banff for a fortnight's holidays.

ACTOR FLIES FROM WIGHT TO MAINLAND.

BOURNMOUTH, England, July 19.—Robert Loraine, an actor, who on July 16, in an attempt to make a flight in a biplane to the Needles and return in a heavy storm and was obliged to land on the Isle of Wight, flew back to the mainland this evening. He made a safe landing here.

MONTREAL, July 19—Malcolm McAvity, of St. John, champion of the maritime provinces, was defeated in the first round of the Quebec tennis championship here today. He lost to Hedley Suckling in the open singles, 6-6, 4-6.

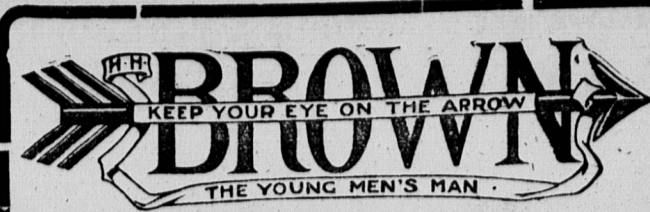
