THE S. S. Restigouche arrived in this port early yesterday morning, with a general cargo. She left last night, taking 1000 bags oats, 700 bushels potatoes, a lot of sundries and 40 head of cattle for St. John's Nfld. The cattle were shipped by E. Wheatley & Co.

YESTERDAY at the Police Court, the Prohibition case of Sarah Jane Higgins was further adjourned till Tuesday. The case against Edmund Harrington was dismissed. The case of George Essory came up in the afternoon. Five witnesses were examined and the case was adjourned till Tuesday.

THE weather being fine it was like a midsummer excursion to see the City of London leaving for West River ports yesterday afternoon, loaded with passengers and freight. The return cargo consisted of 61 bags starch, 52 bushels quahogs, 60 cases eggs, 2 sheep and one beef cow.
