Wreckers Threaten Historic Landmark

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 16.—Progressive demolition contractors who are tearing down the old buildings in the old Montreal, threaten destruction of the historic landmark, the old stone tower of the old St. Pierre and Notre Dame streets in the financial district.

The tower, a structure dating from the French regime, and of further historical importance because during the winter of 1775-76 it became headquarters for the American Army under command of the Montmorency and Arnold. Montreal had been captured by the revolutionary army in November, 1775, and the British Montmorency set off on his adventure to invest Quebec.

In reporting the desire of civic authorities to relieve a traffic bottleneck, the Canadian National Railway's passenger department, interested in the preservation of all such shrines, proposes to carefully raise the building and rebuild it as a museum in a park. In its original glory the stone house was one of the largest and most magnificent in Old Montreal.

Following is the text of the radio broadcast given over C.F.C.Y. on Saturday evening by Mrs. Allison MacMillan.

To the Rural Women of Prince Edward Island, Canada is at war, and in a way of such magnitude that it is difficult to realize its significance, but it is our duty as British subjects to do our bit, and to do it we cannot hope to win. The war is a struggle for the "For Home and Country". In the past we have emphasized the "Home", the time has now come when we must place special stress on "Our Country". There is no question of the fortitude and enduring qualities of the British people and it is this fortitude and endurance which must carry us through this period of stress ahead of us. During the trying days ahead we will have many calls to do our bit to defeat Nazism. The only sure way in which we can do this is by concentrating our efforts on the home front. We must work together and only by such united effort can we produce results. Those who are willing to do this, let us register on Wednesday, the 18th. These women of the rural communities are the backbone of our province and have tremendous capabilities for voluntary service.
