GERMANY IS STRIVING FOR SEA SUPREMACY

WILHELMSHAVEN, Sept. 26.—These boats, only a trifle over \$5,000 throughout the discussions of the British navy estimates this year the next.

The usual date for beginning German warships is in the September or October of the years to which they belong. The official date named by the German authorities for laying down the ships of 1909 program was July 1, so that this at once advanced the dates by two or three months.

The 1909 program consists of four ships—the battleships Ersatz Hildebrand, Ersatz Heimdall, and Ersatz Friedrich, and the armored cruiser "H."

For comparison it may be pointed out that two of the British ships of this year's program were laid down in July, and that the other two are to follow in November.

During a correspondent's visit to the dockyard here he made a significant discovery bearing on this question. The Ersatz Oldeburg is to be launched this month, as soon as possible after she has left the ship, and certainly before the end of the year, another battleship is to be laid down.

This ship will be one of the three battleships of the 1910 program. As the four "contingent" ships of the British 1909 program are not to be laid down until April next, it will be seen that Germany will have a tremendous lead.

Necessary work for the new ship is already being done at the dockyard here. She will be known until the launch as the Ersatz Hagen, and although the only work connected with her that the correspondent was able to see were wooden patterns for certain castings, there is no doubt that a large amount of material is being collected ready for working into the ship as soon as she is laid down.

While work on two of our 1909 ships is not to be started for another two months, Germany has begun work on her 1910 program.

Through the agency of a friend employed in the office of a large shipbuilding firm at Hamburg the correspondent has been able to secure reliable details of the new armored cruisers "G" and "H" of the 1908 and 1909 programs. Speaking in the House of Commons recently, Mr. McKenna stated that information had reached the admiralty of foreign vessels faster and more powerful than our Invincibles.

Nothing was said as to what ships these were, or who was building them, but as no other power in Europe except Germany is building dreadnought cruisers it was plain from the first that Germany was the nation referred to.

It will be seen from the following description of the "G" and "H" that the First Lord's statement was fully justified. These two vessels, both building by Blohm and Voss, and both near the launching stage, will compare with our Invincibles.

The German cruisers will be fast destroyers in every sense of the words, for they will have the same armament as the Nassau, substituting 12-inch for 11-inch guns, while their speed will be some eight knots greater. It is true that our Invincibles greatly exceeded their designed speed, reaching 28 knots, but the engines of the gigantic horse-power above indicated should be able to give the German ships a speed considerably greater than 28 knots.

DESTROYER FLOTILLAS.

There is another series of significant facts which should be widely known in England.

German destroyer flotillas are rapidly approaching the British in numbers, and, indeed, are actually ahead of us in vessels of the most modern types.

BRITAIN'S POSITION.

The present state of British construction is this:—

1906-6 program—Of the six destroyers provided for only four have as yet been delivered.

1907-7—The two vessels of this year are both completed.

1908-8—Of the six destroyers of this year, two are nearly completed and the remainder will be ready in January.

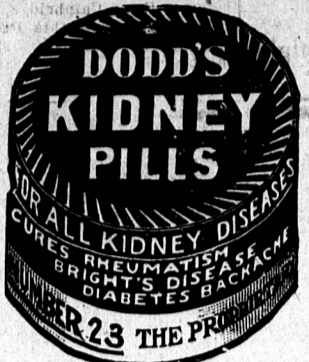
1909-9—Sixteen vessels provided for and now on the stocks.

1910-10—Twenty destroyers provided for. Forms of tender, etc., were to be sent out on September 1, and contracts awarded about the 30th. On

GERMAN WARSHIPS REACH NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—The German cruiser squadron composed of the Victoria Luise, Hertha, Bremen and Dresden, which will participate in the Hudson-Fulton celebration, arrived at New York today, reaching quarantine station at 3.15 a.m.

The British battleship Inflexible under command of Admiral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour, arrived off Sandy Hook this morning and joined the three other British warships which have been awaiting her arrival since yesterday. The British ships remained at anchor off the Hook.

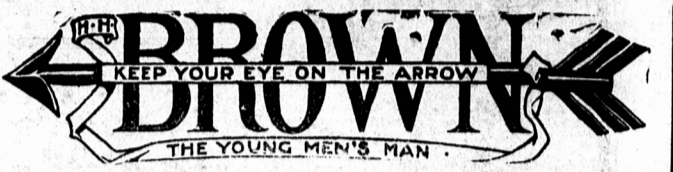
