As announced in THE GUARDIAN Miss Mary Allison Doull has arrived in the City and during the summer months will conduct summer classes in Charlottetown and Summerside. Drawing and painting classes will be held in the W. C. T. U. parlors, Grafton Street on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and in Summerside in the studio of Mrs. Bearsto, Central Street on Saturday and Monday of each week. While Miss Doull has not yet completed the work of arranging her studies from life in charcoal and pen and ink the show is the nucleus of those that will be hung up from time to time. Perhaps the most striking of the collection is the copies from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, including "Barcelona Fishermen" by a Spanish artist. "Fleeing from the Storm" by a French artist is well worthy of a visit to Miss Doull's studio and is one of the finest things shown in Charlottetown for years. A few monotypes and dainty designs for china water colors are also given. The public are cordially asked to visit the studio and examine the work today from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m.

PHOTOGRAPHY is a hobby that may be ridden for itself alone, or may be made to render some other pastime more delightful. STOCK NOTES.—While at the Allen Farm, Eicher again made good as a "King" maker by developing the stallion Kremlin and driving him to the world's record of 2.07 1/2 at Nashville, Tenn. on November 12th 1892. At the Lexington Ky. meeting that fall he won with this stallion the great Transylvania stake defeating a big field of 13 horses the pick of the country. It was a straight heat affair, the time being 2.11 1/2, 2.12, 2.11 1/2. The first heat Kremlin stepped the final quarter in 30 1/2 seconds, a 2.03 clip something marvelous for those days, and even now quarters at that clip are not as frequent as four leaf clover. The great Kentucky horseman, Mr. Brodhead, said it was the greatest race ever trotted. Time is less to be considered than class in racing, is the way he put it, and the brilliancy of Kremlin's victory is simply dazzling when we consider the class of the field he beat, and the way he did it, trotting from last position clear around it in one heat, again trotting around and through the field in the stretch in the second, and fighting one of the fastest and gamest race mares (Hamlin's Nightingale) yet produced, every foot of the route in the final heat. "Kalo," owned by J. M. Nicholson, Charlottetown, is sired by this World's Champion.
