The second of the Saturday papers of the Charlottetown school of music, was read on the seventh inst., by the Director Professor W. H. Watts. For some unexplained reason the paper on Music as a Recreation, as a Medicine and as a Moral Force was not read. The pianiste of the occasion was Miss Maud Waterman (organist of Zion church, city). Her selections were Polka de la Reine by Raff, The Adagio Canabile from the Sonata, Pathetique by Beethoven, the Polka Brillant by Weber, and on the professor's preferring the request that Miss Waterman would leave on the minds of the listeners something to think about, rather than that to merely admire Miss Waterman played the Schubert Impromptu in A flat. Her readings are thoughtful. The music has a mission and she is worthily fitting herself to be an interpreter. Her brilliant execution in Raff Polka and especially in the dashing Polacca was warmly applauded. The director stated Miss Waterman was one of the cleverest excursions he had met on the Island, stated that she was worthy of a larger and higher musical atmosphere and that she would attain it. The vocalist was Professor Barlow. His three songs were "Two Stars," "Gull Keep Thee" and "My Kingdom." He was in excellent voice, he enjoys singing, studies daily from a sense of duty that impels him to do well all he undertakes from a sense of enjoyment in his work. There is always inspiration in his singing. The director thanked him for his service of song, so keenly appreciated week by week at the hospital. Analytical notes to the pieces proved very interesting. That some pieces can paint a picture while others only depict sound was made plain under the captions of "Objective and Subjective in Music." A fair sized audience showed their appreciation of an hour's education and enjoyment. Mr. Watts announced that one of the juniors would be the soloist on the next occasion. Mrs. CS Moore has kindly consented to sing. Mr. Watts would give excerpts from and a paper on the Song Without Words of Mendelssohn.

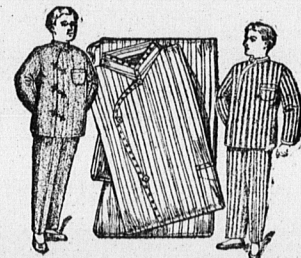
