SASKATCHEWAN ELECTIONS

REGINA, June 17—The issue of the election writs in Saskatchewan, finds both parties in good shape for the fight. The conservatives have candidates in all constituencies but one. In the remaining district, Mile stone, the convention will be held to- morrow. A. E. Whitmore, the pre- sent member is in Rochester, Minn., awaiting an operation and will not likely be able to enter the fight. It is expected either T. J. How, of Rouleau, or Sam Taylor of Yellow Grass, will be the candidate. The government claims to see every indi- cation of success. With the advan- tage of first knowing as to the date of the elections, the government for- ces were in a position to complete their organization before the issue of the writs and they have thus gained the first score over their opponents. Independent candidates will form an important factor in the present cam- paign. There is an independent candidate in Swift Current against Premier Scott, in addition to the straight candidate of the conserva- tives and another has taken the field in Arm River. There is every prob- ability of more independents taking part in the campaign.

In his proclamation to the elec- tors, Premier Scott, said: "My gov- ernment has been in office for nearly seven years. During that period we have had to deal with a large number of very important problems, including the elevator question, the creation of a provincial system of telephones, the establishment of a provincial university and agricul- tural colleges, the passing laws in the interests of artisans and workmen, the insurance problem, railway ex- tension, the protection of the public health, the creation of rural uni- versities, the organization of high schools, and colleges, and the erec- tion of public institutions, including our legislative buildings at Regina. The assertion has been made that the government would not appeal to the electors on its record. This is sheer nonsense. There is not a single problem with which we have dealt, that we are not prepared to discuss from the public platform. If here is one thing more than an- other which the electors should con- sider it as our past program of safe and sane legislation, our splendid financial position, and our business- like administration."

ROOSEVELT'S LINE OF ATTACK

CHICAGO, June 17—On the eve of the republican national convention Colonel Roosevelt tonight disclosed the line of attack which he will make. He laid down two principles, he said, that the delegates whose selection he contests, must not vote in the organiza- tion of the convention or upon the settlement of the contests, and make it clear that he would resist it. He declared that no action on the con- vention based upon the votes of these raudulently seated delegates would be binding upon the republican army.

It was at the Roosevelt rally in the auditorium that the ex-president made his challenge. He was facing a hearing through which jammed the huge building as lightly as the fire marshall would permit. Reaching far to the rear, to the last line of seats, and to the top of the topmost balcony, rows of men and women delegates from every part of the country, Roosevelt leaders and a host of privates in the Roosevelt army. They gave the ex-president a mighty welcome. Colonel Roosevelt made a fitting speech. His hearers were in fighting mood. They cheered him as he denounced his opponents and shouted to him "Go to him, Teddy," "Knock out the steam roller." "Hit them again."

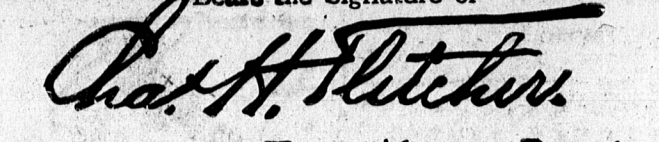
