NEW LONDON MOTOR BUSES

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Some of the new London motor busses for which people have been waiting so long are now beginning to make their debut on the streets. The chief points that strike one about these busses are the absence of advertisements and the fact that the drivers sit alongside the bonnet instead of being in the usual way.

The chief features of the new motor busses were explained to a representative of The Christian Science Monitor by a motor bus inspector, who said: "By altering the position of the driver's seat, we are able to provide seating accommodation for 12th ber people on the bus, and we have done this without increasing the size of the vehicle. The platform at the back has been considerably increased in size, so that people can now come down from the top of the bus, and alight with one another. This means that the busses will be able to discharge their passengers and alight new passengers to get on board in very much less time and with far less jostling and scrambling than formerly. In the center of the platform is an upright rail, which will be of great assistance to those agile passengers who persist in getting off the bus before it stops."

Inside the bus the inspector pointed out the straps which were provided for the use of the standing people. These have been done away with and upright brass rails have been substituted. It is presumed that the idea in abolishing the straps is to abolish the strap hanger.

In reply to the question as to how would affect the steering, the inspector said he did not think the drivers found the new busses any harder to drive. In fact the opinion seemed to be that they were, if anything, easier to manage.

The busses certainly look more comfortably ride in, the seats, inside being placed crosswise facing the front, except those beside the door. There was about the top-heavy appearance there was about the old busses, owing to the fact that they are slung lower on the springs, and are nearer the ground. These details, however, diminish in importance before the fact that when more busses are running, the dweller in Suburbia, who at present waits on the curb watching the packed busses go by, will be able to get home earlier.

HAVE FED 584,303 RETURNED MEN

An idea of the extent of the work done by the Knights of Columbus Catholic Army Huts for returned soldiers and sailors throughout the Dominion may be gathered from a glance at the latest official report of that organization, which shows that over half a million men have been served with meals in the various huts, from Halifax to Vancouver. These figures cover the nine months from the opening of the centres in February up to the present time.

Since the commencement of the work in Canada, coincident with the return of the first Canadian units from overseas last winter, 584,303 meals have been served and 152,223 beds occupied. Of these some 150,000 meals and 35,000 beds were given to returned men absolutely free of charge.

The work will be carried on in all large centres throughout the winter, special efforts being made to care for ex-soldiers and sailors, not only in regard to bed and board, but generally with reference to their settling down into civilian life. This line of the work is being specially developed and offices have been opened throughout the country, where the soldier may find assistance and advice in his various difficulties, military or otherwise.

The work is being extended in every way to meet the requirements of the situation during the winter, and information and service work is being made a specialty.

CRISIS IN AUSTRIA FEARED IMMINENT

BERNE, Nov. 19.—A serious crisis appears imminent in Austria, according to advices received here. Political discontent and the economic distress are arousing the people. The Vienna Government, it is reported, is unable to maintain its powers, and the republic is likely to fall to pieces, several groups declaring for a union with Germany.

It is asserted that the Austrian army will not attempt to prevent a new revolution as its officers have for some time been gradually replaced with Socialists.

CANNOT BREATHE LYING DOWN.

In certain conditions of unhealth persons breathe comfortably when sitting, but cannot breathe comfortably lying down. Three English physicians explain this in the Journal of Physiology by showing that of oxygen causes shallow, quick breathing, this again causes uneven ventilation of the lungs. The recumbent posture tends to accentuate any irregularity in the expansion of the lungs.

There are patients who have an abnormally great drain of oxygen in the systemic blood, and the oxygenation

of the blood in the lungs is inefficiently carried out, therefore the blood is not sufficiently oxygenated. When they lie down the shallowness of their breathing tends to decrease this already insufficient oxygenation; thus they suffer.

The Journal of the American Medical Association remarks that corsets will help to increase this difficulty by hampering the expansion of the lungs.
