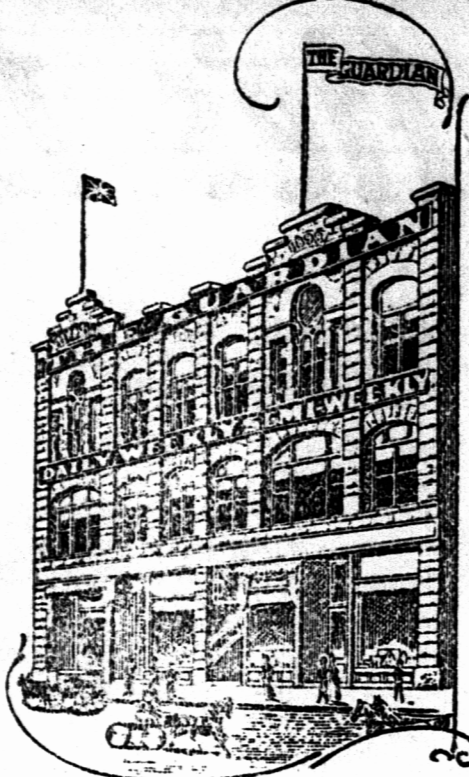

**THE CHRONICLE AND
THE DOUKHOBORS.**

The Halifax Chronicle speaks very positively as to what is the matter with the Doukhobors and how best to dispose of them. As to their recent pilgrimage it says the cause "may be indicated in a word—insanity. Their inner light has crazed them." As to the best way out of Canada's difficulty in disposing of the Doukhobors The Chronicle has this to say:

A good Northwest blizzard while they are on their present "pilgrimage" would very definitely, and probably to the ultimate satisfaction of Canada, settle the question so far as most of that insane and unlettered rabble is concerned.

No one can possibly mistake the spirit in which The Chronicle's article was conceived and expressed. Its cold brutality is too apparent. The Doukhobors are insane, it says, and why? Their "inner light," by which they mean the Spirit of God within, has crazed them! These people do not believe in all things as we

do; they are doubtless to some extent under a delusion, but they are not insane in the common and legitimate acceptation of the word. And if they were really insane, who but The Chronicle would care to attribute their mental alienation to such a cause?

The wish is no doubt father to the thought that it would be a fortunate thing if all the Doukhobors should perish in a blizzard. The Northwest blizzard is an awful thing of itself, a hurricane accompanied by intense cold and driving frost or snow, fatal to all who are long exposed to its fury. It is usually spoken of with dread and dismay. But to The Chronicle's editor's mind it would be a "good" blizzard that would "definitely settle" the Doukhobors on their march—in other words freeze them to death! The same spirit that lighted the martyr-fires in the past lies behind The Chronicle's suggestions. Possibly freezing may be a less painful form of death than burning, but the end is the same. And why is this terrible penalty invoked upon the poor Doukhobors? Because, according to The Chronicle, they are insane, and because they are so it would be well that they should be exposed to an awful and agonising death. Could cruelty and brutality go further than this?

But not content with hoping that the Doukhobors should be mercilessly exposed to death, The Chronicle must needs slander the people of the Dominion by the statement that the wholesale destruction of the pilgrims on their march would be "to the ultimate satisfaction of Canada." It is one of the leading organs of the Dominion Government in Eastern Canada, that thus speaks, however irresponsible may be the hand that guides the editorial pen. We doubt very much whether even so strong a Government as that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier can safely afford to permit a repetition in its organ of such reckless and cruel slanders. What will they say in Russia when they learn that an official mouthpiece of the Canadian Government wishes the Doukhobor pilgrims frozen to death in a body? On behalf of the merciful, humane and Christian people of Canada we resent The Chronicle's imputations upon their honor and humanity. No such false version of the facts as to public feeling in Canada should be permitted to go uncontradicted into general circulation. And the Laurier Government would do well to curb the rash and ill-judged utterances of their Halifax organ while there is yet time.

Highly creditable to Editor Macmillan and his bright staff is the November number of The Prince of Wales College Observer. It contains a variety of interesting matter in prose and verse giving expression to the lights and shadows of collegiate life, the light and humorous side predominating. The effort to maintain a creditable college journal is well worthy of the support of advertising and reading patrons of the press.
