THE HUNTER RIVER MEETING.

The meeting at Hunter River on Saturday created very general interest and THE GUARDIAN report was the subject of much favorable comment yesterday. The electors present appear to have given close attention to the several addresses while the rival candidates treated each other with becoming courtesy and fairness and presented their respective claims with moderation. The outcome of the meeting was such as to give rise to the confident hope that when a convention is hereafter held it will result in retiring one of the two present candidates and a general union of forces in favor of the candidate who secures the nomination of that body.

There seems to be no question that Mr. Haszard produced an excellent impression at the meeting. He has the true parliamentary style of speaking, is clear and concise in his methods, does not repeat himself, is collected, calm and moderate in his statements, and is full of information in regard to the Island's every interest. As far as the City and Royalty are concerned there seems no doubt that he will go to the convention assured of a large majority of delegates, and all the information we have been able to gather shows that he is steadily gaining ground in the rural districts of the riding. All who read dispassionately the report of the Hunter River meeting must be satisfied that Mr. Haszard was abundantly justified in taking the field when he did, and that no man has stronger claims or better qualifications to be an able, creditable and efficient representative of the metropolitan constituency of West Queens, and of the entire Island, than he has.

The Columbia won the first of the America Cup races on Saturday, by a narrow margin, although the Shamrock led the way for twenty miles of the thirty. The race was over a distance of 30 miles, 15 to windward and back to the starting point. The next race, and the third and fifth, if so many are sailed, will be around a triangle of ten mile sides. Each race must be sailed within five and a half hours from time of starting, and three races out of five are necessary to win the cup.

A curious illustration of how a Bible text may be found for almost any occasion is furnished in the sermon preached on Sunday the 22nd, by Rev. Dr. Reed Mackay of New York, to the crew of the yacht Shamrock on a text taken from Isaiah xxxiii, 23, which reads: "Their tacklings are loosed; they could not well strengthen their mast; they could not spread the sail; then is the prey of a great spoil divided; the lame take the prey." Dr. Mackay said this was a prophecy of victory for the Shamrock, the last clause being especially applicable to Sir Thomas Lipton, who is still lame from the effects of a recent accident. The clergyman's discourse was greatly admired by the sailors of the Irish yacht, but was not so much relished by the sympathizers with the Columbia, many of whom were present. The first race has not borne out Dr. Mackay's confident prediction. We can hardly think that the prophet Isaiah intended any reference to a yacht race when he wrote the text in question, and we will not be convinced that he did so intended even if the Shamrock should succeed in winning the America Cup.

St. John is made happy again by the announcement from Ottawa that the Royal Party will spend a day and a half in that city, will occupy the residences provided and will hold a reception. A considerable military review is also promised.

There is little in "Condor" letter in yesterday's Examiner to call for a reply. No one will misjudge the pretty town of Souris because there are bad elements there, as there are in all towns and villages. The letters we printed were from reputable citizens of Souris. The object of the writers, we are assured, was the suppression of the illegal sale of liquor. If "Condor" also wants the unlawful traffic suppressed he should lend a hand in that work. Abuse of THE GUARDIAN such as "Condor" indulges in is pleasant reading for those in the liquor trade, but will not be so regarded by temperance people generally.

Premier Farquharson's announcement that he intends retiring at an early day from the Premiership will be read by many with regret. It opens the question of a reconstruction of the local Administration under a new leader. It is deeply to be regretted if the condition of Mr. Farquharson's health is such that he feels compelled to retire from the duties of the Premiership. All will concede that he has given much time and labor to the duties of his position. But we fail to see that the duties of a representative at Ottawa, if rightly attended to, would be any less arduous than those of the Premiership. Four or five months hotel life at Ottawa with the late night sittings, exciting debates and the constant demands of constituents, have broken down many a strong man in the past. A strong man in every sense of the word is needed as an Ottawa representative.

There will be this year a highly interesting election for the Mayoralty of New York. All the anti-Tammany elements appear to have united on President Seth Low of Columbia University, a man of ability and high character, and under the present outlook he has a good chance of election. Mr. Low was for four years Mayor of Brooklyn before its annexation to greater New York, and gave that city the best city government it ever had. He was an independent candidate for Mayor of New York in 1897, but the Republicans had then their own candidate and it was a three cornered fight. Now the Republicans and Citizens' Union have united in nominating Mr. Low. In 1897 the vote stood: Van Wyck, (Tammany) 233,997 votes; Low, (independent) 151,540; Tracy, (Republican) 101,863. There were several other candidates, Jeffersonian Democrat, social labor, prohibition, etc., whose vote aggregated 39,157. It is confidently expected that if Mr. Low is elected he will be an honest, upright, business-like Mayor.
