A Boston despatch of August 21st says: The steamer Halifax was towed to the dry dock at East Boston yesterday for examination. Inspector Grouse, of the Board of Health completed his examination of the cargo and condemned a large amount of the fish, poultry and meat, amounting to an estimated value of twenty thousand dollars. The loss of \$964 falls on the owners of the fresh fish, and shippers of the two thousand barrels of mackerel lose \$9,625.

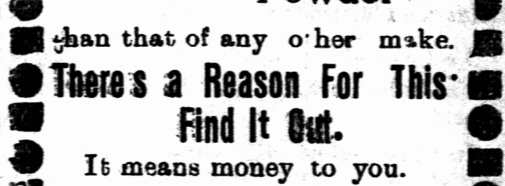
